Ann R. Riley

Homemaker

Ann R. (Concannon) Riley was "a wonderful housewife and mother for over 56 years," said her husband, Charles A. Riley Sr. Mrs. Riley died Sunday, April 13, 1997, at the Youville Hospital. She was 81 and had endured a lengthy illness.

Born in Cambridge, Mrs. Riley was a lifelong resident. She was the devoted wife of Charles of Cambridge, the mother of Charles A. Riley, Jr. of the Philippines, Thomas J. Riley of Waltham, Ann M. Quigley of Quincy, Brian F. Riley of Grafton, Kevin M. Riley of Quincy, Mary T. Frawley of Waltham, and Kathleen R. Riley of Medford.

She was the sister of John J. Concannon of Weymouth, and the late Sarah Bradley, Mary Gallagher and Bernard Concannon. She was the sister-in-law of Margaret Rudolph of Florida, Marilyn Sullivan of Tewksbury, Sister Joan Mehigan of Somerville, and the late Caroline O'Hara and John Riley. Mrs. Riley is survived by 11 grandchildren. A funeral Mass was held at St. John's Church. Burial was private.

Dr. George Wald

Nobel laureate, Harvard biologist

George Wald, the Higgins Professor of Biology (Emeritus) at Harvard University and the 1967 winner of the Nobel Prize in Medicine or Physiology for his research on the biochemistry of vision, died quietly at his Cambridge home Saturday, April 12, 1997. He was 90 and had experienced declining health for two years.

Dr. Wald was born in Manhattan's lower East Side and moved to Brooklyn as a child. He received an undergraduate degree in zoology and went

on to do graduate work at Columbia University. He completed his fellowship at the University of Chicago and in 1934 was made a tutor in biochemical sciences at Harvard, where he stayed for 43 years.

In his remarks on receiving the Nobel Prize, Dr. Wald said, "A scientist lives with all reality. There is nothing better. To know reality is to accept it, and eventually to love it. A scientist is in a sense a child. There is something of the scientist in every child. Others must outgrow it. Scientists can stay that way all their lives."

Dr. Wald is survived by his wife, Ruth Hubbard; his four children, Dr. Michael K. Wald of Elmira, NY, David R. Wald of Monument Beach, Elijah Wald of Somerville, and Deborah H. Wald of San Francisco; nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. Burial was private; a memorial service is being planned. The family asks that in lieu of flowers, donations be sent to the American Friends Service Committee, 2161 Mass. Helen Lattarulo

Homemaker

Helen (Puccini) Lattarulo died Thursday, April 3, 1997, at Neville Manor. She was 85 and had endured an extended illness.

Ms. Lattarulo was born in New York City and was a longtime resident of Cambridge. She was a dedicated homemaker.

Carlos Sergio Santos, a longtime resident of Cambridge, died suddenly Saturday, April 5, 1997, at Cambridge Hospital. He was 35.

Mr. Santos was born in Aldeia Nova, Portugal. He worked as an administrator at the John Hancock Insurance Co.

Mr. Santos was the son of Euclides and Alfredina A. (Soares) Santos and the brother of the late Eurico Soares Santos.

A funeral was held April 9 at the Rogers Funeral Home, followed by a Funeral Mass at St. Anthony's Church. Mr. Santos was buried in Portugal.

John Barnard Bennett

Lecturer, Harvard Business School

John Barnard Bennett, officer, writer, publication manager, consultant and gentleman, died in Cambridge on January 5, 1997.

Mr. Bennett was born in Clinton, attended Worcester Academy and Wesleyan University, and completed graduate work at Harvard University. He served in World War II and in the Korean War, and retired in 1979 as a Lt. Colonel. He retired from Harvard Business School as Lecturer of Oral and Written Communications in 1978. In retirement he pursued financial management and personal investment,

and he volunteered at the First Parish Church, the Unitarian Universalist Association and the Star Island Memorial Corporation.

Mr. Bennett was the husband of Faye Anderson Bennett, and the father of Deborah Barnard Ninios of Athens, Greece, and Peter Dudley Bennett of Reading, Vermont, and his children Andreas Barnard Ninios and Elizabeth Lowell Bennett.

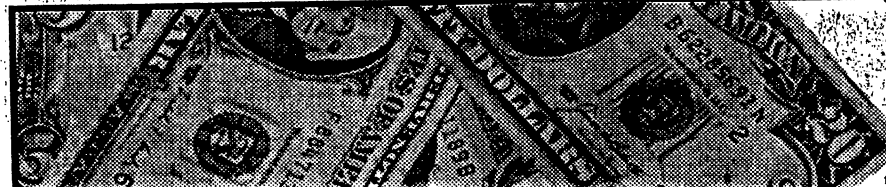
There was standing room only at St. Joseph's Church in Medford Tuesday morning as more than 50 teens and others gathered to say goodbye to 16-year-old Stephanie Visconti, a Matignon High School student who died Friday morning from meningitis.

"I believe God touches some of us and these people are destined for greatness," read Jason Raia, Christian Youth Organization leader for St. Joseph's, from a statement written by the Medford teen's father, William Visconti. "I believe my daughter Stephanie was one of these people," said the statement, which refers to his daughter as an "angel." "The word 'unique' is most often used to describe her and this is a most appropriate description, unique and special. While most of us fall prey to the pressures of society to conform to its standards, Stephanie marched to her own drummer."

Speaking at a luncheon following the funeral and burial, Visconti's parents remembered laughingly how their daughter, a Matignon junior, had tried blue, green, red and yellow hair.

"And if anyone tried to copy her, she'd change right away," her mother Marion, said of her eldest daughter.

"She always found a way to be different," said fellow Matignon student
