Born in Cambridge, he was always interested in everything pertaining to the welfare of our city. He served a district of Cambridge in the Massachusetts Legislature and in the year 1901 he was Mayor of Cambridge. Later he was honored by being appointed a member of the State Industrial Accident Board by the Governor. In all of these positions he served faithfully and well.

I recommend that suitable action be taken by your honorable board as a tribute of respect to his memory in which action I shall be glad to join.

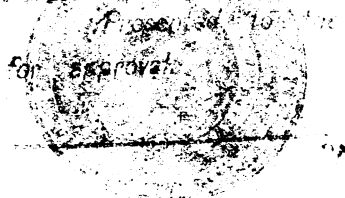
David T. Dickinson was born in this city in 1867 and resided here practically all his life. Early in life he showed an interest in public affairs and represented the Second Middlesex District in the Legislature of 1895-1896-1897. In the year 1901 he served one term as Mayor and in 1912 was appointed a member of the Massachusetts ^{Board} Industrial ~~Commission~~. He served as a member of this ^{Board} ~~Commission~~ until forced to resign because of ill health a few months ago. In matters of public concern he was always vitally interested and his personal influence often tended to shape in some degree the final result. His sterling honesty, his unaffected simplicity and his thorough sincerity were the outstanding characteristics by which he was familiarly known.

It is therefore

RESOLVED:

That the City Council hereby record the public loss sustained not only to the City of Cambridge but to the entire State of Massachusetts in the death of our former mayor and we hereby offer tender tribute to his memory. His was a good example of true citizenship.
