To the Honorable, the City Council:

It is my sad duty to officially notify you of the death of Wellington Fillmore, which occurred at his home in this city on September 8, 1930.

During the years 1890-1-2 he was a member of the old Common Council, and during the years 1893-4 was a member of the Board of Aldermen. He also represented this city in the Massachusetts Legislature during the years 1895-6, and he was a member of the Cambridge Water Board from 1896 to 1903. During all of these years he gave faithful and efficient service. As a substantial business man he was always interested in the civic affairs of Cambridge.

I respectfully recommend that suitable action be taken by your honorable body as a tribute of respect to his memory, in which action I shall be glad to join.
