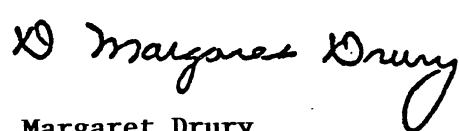

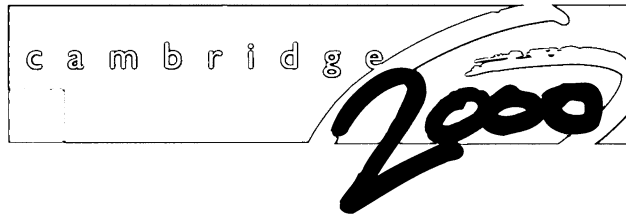

I am hereby requesting the transfer of \$215,026 in the Grant Fund of the Community Development Salary and Wages Account to the Other Ordinary Maintenance Account (\$211,431) and from the Travel and Training Account to the Other Ordinary Maintenance Account (\$3,595).
