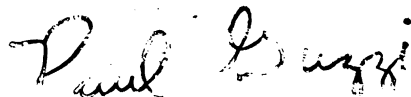

(c) To cooperate with schools and colleges, universities and educational institutions and foundations in the preparation of learning materials and teaching materials and in other matters connected with the purposes and activities of the corporation, and to make and award contributions, grants, fellowships and loans for such purposes;

(d) To accept by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise property of every kind and description, without limit as to amount;

(e) To purchase, take on lease or otherwise acquire, hold, invest, reinvest, use, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchange, sell, assign, transfer or otherwise dispose of both real and personal property of every kind and description, and any interest in property; and to exercise in respect of any and all property any and all rights and privileges of ownership in such manner as in the judgment of the Board of Trustees or Directors will best promote the objects of the corporation;

(f) To have offices, and to promote and carry out its objects and purposes, and to exercise its powers, within or without the Commonwealth of Massachusetts;

(g) To enter into, make, perform and carry out any contracts or agreements for any purposes or objects herein set forth, without limits as to amount, with any individual, firm, association, corporation or entity;

(h) To do everything and anything reasonably and lawfully necessary, suitable, proper or convenient for the achievement of the purposes above stated, or for any of them, or for the furtherance of said purposes.

This corporation is not organized and shall not be conducted for the pecuniary profit of its trustees, officers, members or any other person, and it may not issue stock nor declare or distribute dividends. No part of its net income, nor any balance of money or assets remaining after payment of its debts shall inure to the benefit of its trustees, directors, officers, members or any other person, but shall be devoted solely to the educational, scientific and charitable purposes of the corporation; provided trustees, officers and employees shall be entitled to payment of reasonable compensation for their services to the corporation.

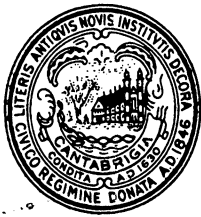
2. The purposes for which the corporation is formed are as follows:

First: Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law.

In furtherance of these public purposes, it shall have power:

(a) To raise funds for the establishment of a college, university, or school of learning which will promote the public welfare and the advancement of learning by performing research, developmental and experimental work and by gathering information and data as to the means and methods of teaching in the fields of vocational, liberal arts, technical, occupational and science education.

(b) To develop prepare and assemble, books, reports, pamphlets, films or other printed or graphic material dealing with educational, scientific, or technical subjects, or with the purposes and activities of the corporation;

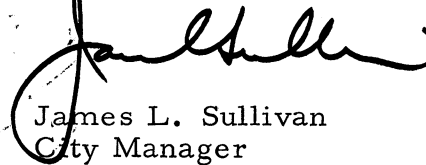
