THE CAMBRIDGE ROOM

Guarded by the handsome bust of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, the Cambridge room is a repository of information on many facets of Cambridge history. From profiles of famous Cantabrigians to city directories to a table made from the wood of the wonderful Washington Elm, the Cambridge Room is a resource for many research projects. Each year, architecture students consult the atlases to determine prior use of specific sites for a project they are assigned. Frequently requested materials include city atlases, Sanborn maps, business and biographical files as well as city annual reports. The collection also includes early histories of Cambridge, Proprietor's Records, and literary works, primarily of the 19th and early 20th centuries, and most notably Oliver Wendell Holmes, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, James Russell Lowell, and Margaret Fuller. There is a small collection of prints, photographs, and slides. The slide collection includes those made for an interesting program created in the late 1970's about the city's ethnic heritage, and has recently grown with the addition of portraits of Cambridge houses. Although the Cambridge Room is not open to the public at this time, material can be requested for use in the Reference Room. Many items that people are looking for can actually also be found in the Reference Room collection of Cambridge materials. Please don't hesitate to ask!



LET US HELP YOU WITH YOUR TAXES!

Every year the Cambridge Public Library makes tax forms, both federal and state, available to the public at all its locations. In addition to the basic 1040 form, schedules, and reproducible forms, the Main Library stocks over 30 commonly used forms and publications.

Free tax assistance is also available. This is provided through the Library's participation in Harvard University's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program, known as VITA. Over the years, students from the Harvard Law School, volunteering with VITA, have helped hundreds of library patrons in preparing their tax returns. Although open to all, the primary aim of this program is to help the disadvantaged, the elderly, and those new to this country.

FROM THE DIRECTOR

The Cambridge Public Library is pleased to be celebrating the 25th anniversary of its partnership with the Cambridge Black Cultural and Historical Association. The Cambridge Public Library was a trailblazer in the development of programs and services to meet the needs of the many ethnic groups in its community. Under former Library Director Joseph Sakey's leadership, the library sought to extend its reach into the community, to attract non-users into the library, and to create a library system that was relevant and welcoming to all. Mr. Sakey; the late Jerome Lewis, Assistant Director of the Library; Edward Chase; Clorae Evereteze; Reverend Herbert Edwards; Sharon Shelton; Leroy Johnson; Imani Berryman; and Kathleen Walcott joined together to develop programs on black culture for the library. Their first program was *Perspectives in Black* in 1972. The group continued to meet under the name *Perspectives in Black* until 1974 when they became the Black Cultural Association.

On March 9th, the association and the library will celebrate African American Literature with Henry Louis Gates, Jr., co-editor of the *Norton Anthology of African American Literature*. Professor Gates is the Chair of the Afro-American Studies Department at Harvard University, a noted author in his own right, and a well known scholar and teacher.

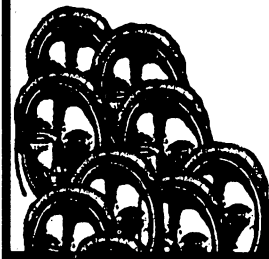
At the program the Black Cultural and Historical Association will present its annual Community Service Award to Curtis and Kimberly Jackman, the founders and organizers of the Cambridge Jets Youth Club. Mr. and Mrs. Jackman founded the track club in 1987 to help two young girls prepare for high school track and field. The girls told their friends and the club grew. The Jackmans have trained more than 150 athletes from all ethnic backgrounds. The youngsters have competed in over ten cities within Massachusetts and in eight states. Many of the athletes come from impoverished single parent families. Mr. and Mrs. Jackman have demonstrated an exceptional commitment to the young people of Cambridge and have provided an invaluable service to their families and to the community. We are pleased to honor them for their outstanding contributions to the city.

The Cambridge Public Library is proud of the longevity and productivity of its association with the Cambridge Black Cultural and Historical Association.
