- WHEREAS: The most evil element of human nature was revealed during the Nazi reign of terror, 1933-1945, when the Third Reich murdered six million Jews, and thousands of Catholic and Protestant clergy and lay people, Jehovah's Witnesses, political dissidents, gay men and lesbians, disabled people, and gypsies; and
- WHEREAS: During the same period of time, extraordinary courage and integrity was demonstrated by the many people who risked their own lives by working in the Resistance and hiding individuals the Nazis sought to murder; and
- WHEREAS: The cultures that the Nazi party strove to annihilate have continued to thrive, thus epitomizing human resilience; and
- WHEREAS: The United States Congress established the United States Holocaust Memorial Council and legislation to provide ways for the nation to commemorate the Days of Remembrance, and has encouraged cities to sponsor appropriate observances; and
- WHEREAS: Cambridge residents from diverse backgrounds will gather on April 10, 1991 at Temple Beth Shalom to honor those who were killed in the Holocaust and pay tribute to those who had the courage to fight against the Nazi effort with an interfaith program called "Remembrance, Resistance, and Resilience: 50 Years of Courage,"; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That this City Council, in memory of the Holocaust, hereby designates April 7-14, 1991 as the Days of Remembrance of the Holocaust; and further be it
- RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council dedicates this week to remembering those who perished in the Holocaust, those who courageously participated in the Resistance, and the remarkable resilience shown by the cultures that survived; and further be it

RESOLVED: That this City Council invites all Cambridge residents to participate in the Holocaust Commemoration Program at 7:00 p.m. on April 10, 1991 at Temple Beth Shalom; and further be it

RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to prepare a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution for presentation at the Holocaust Commemoration Program.

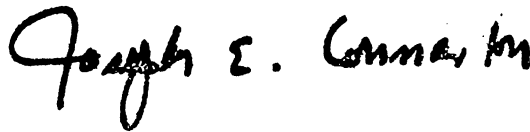
