

AN ORDINANCE

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Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

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ARTICLE V: Fire Department Fee Schedule

Sec. 10-33. Fees for Permits and Inspections Required by General Laws, Chapter 148.

The Fire Department will charge fees for permits and inspections required by G.L.c.148, according to the schedules set forth in the following sections. Where the amount of the fee is more than \$10.00, the amount in excess of \$10.00 is for the inspection which is required in conjunction with the issuance of the permit.

Poet and orchestra team up in new work

She is sometimes described as "the princess of black poetry." She has published 17 books of poetry and essays, including "Gemini," "Black Judgment" and "A Dialogue: James Baldwin and Nikki Giovanni." For the past year, Nikki Giovanni has been collaborating with composer Robert Kyr, composer-in-residence at the Mystic Valley Orchestra, on an orchestral work incorporating her writing. "A Signal in the Land" will have its New England premiere this Sunday at Paine Hall of Harvard University.

Described as "an orchestral drama for narrator and orchestra," "A Signal in the Land" features text by Giovanni and Martin Luther King Jr., and has as its theme the struggle for human rights. Giovanni, who bases herself in Cincinnati, will read the narration at the May 3 performance.

The work was commissioned by the Johnson City (Tennessee) Symphony and the Tennessee Arts Commission. It premiered in March in Johnson City, with Giovanni performing the narration, to popular and critical acclaim. "The wonderful thing about Ms. Giovanni's poetry is that she translates the black experience into a universal one easily recognizable by those who will listen. The final musical episode is a noble and impressive statement of great beauty

which also translates the human experience into universal terms," wrote Kenton Coe in the *Johnson City Press*.

The Mystic Valley Orchestra will also perform Beethoven's Eighth Symphony and Debussy's "Afternoon of a Faun," conducted by Music Director Ronald Feldman, at the May 3 concert. Tickets are \$6 general admission, \$4 students and seniors.

Giovanni will also speak and read from her work on Monday, May 4 in Emerson Hall, room 105, at Harvard University. That appearance, sponsored by the Harvard University Expository Writing Program, is free and begins at 8 p.m.

Real meatballs and pizza in Medford

We were about to order and I knew I wanted to try DePasquale Brother's Fettuccini Alfredo. But I also wanted to order something off the beaten trail of Italian delicacies.

The menu offered a "single meat cake" that sounded intriguing. I pronounced it very carefully for the waitress: "Pol...pet...te."

"Oh," she said. "You want a meatball."

We were in search of extraordinary Italian culinary experiences in Medford because we'd heard that DePasquale Brothers made superb pizza.

We hoped the talent would spread to its other menu items. In the end, we found the food often good, but not particularly inspired.

Of course, this is from a group of people who didn't know what meatball was in Italian. And we arrived late on a Sunday evening, after all, when inspiration levels are not at their highest. Cramped beside a long table downstairs, surrounded by terracotta walls and piped-in Musak, we ate without much serious complaint, but not a lot of compliments, either. It may have been a case of overly-great expectations from a solid local Italian restaurant.

It varied very little from the chef's salad (\$3.95).

The pasta e fagioli soup (\$1.95 for a cup; \$3.75 for a dish), however, was delicious. It was possibly the most stimulating item we tasted that evening.

Our selections of entrees varied

from very good to fair. The fettuccini (\$6.95), for example, was probably not made as Alfredo originally intended it. If it was, my taste buds have grown accustomed to a richer, creamier version than the one the DePasquale Bros. presented. It was extremely buttery, but otherwise plain.

The spaghetti with clams (\$8.95), however, was one of the better entrees of the evening. It came with lots of fresh clams in a thin but good sauce.

We were helped through a meal by a good choice of the wine list, Chianti Classico (\$10.95). It went well with the Veal Marsala (\$9.95), which got good marks for its tenderness and flavor. The portion was also large, as was the case with the Eggplant Parmegians (\$6.75). The eggplant was also delicious, and it came smothered in mozzarella, but not enough spice to carry off the whole thing.

But, hey, no real hard complaints that a real delicious canoli or pastry couldn't obliterate from memory. Unfortunately, DePasquale Brothers had only spumoni (\$1.95) for dessert that night. It was almost floating in a cherry sauce and didn't provide the best final impression.

Nor did watching the help clean up as we lingered over our coffee make us feel at home in what must ordinarily be a very homey place. It's sort of like taking out your toothbrush when you want recalcitrant dinner guests to leave.

But some day we'll go back and try the pizza.

In a city bursting with ice cream shops — seventeen at last count — you would think that the last thing anyone would do is open another ice cream parlor. But that's exactly what Huron Drug's Roberta Crowley just did.

"The love of my childhood was to walk to the neighborhood store to look at magazines and have an ice cream," says Crowley, an enthusiastic, attractive woman. So, when Crowley expanded into the space vacated by Huron Animal Clinic last year, she put in a small ice cream parlor.

Crowley says it's not much, and she's right. Perched on a raised platform in the back of the store are two small, round tables and a short counter. A handful of old-fashioned parlor chairs, plus the requisite number of stools, complete the scene. Several feet away, the neighborhoods post office occupies another corner of this 84-year-old drug store.

It may not be much to look at but it is just right for this little neighborhood drug store. While you

savor your cone you can watch the shoppers quietly hunt for the right greeting card or hair brush or, if you follow in Crowley's footsteps, you can catch up with the latest news. However you savor your chilly treat, you are welcome to stay for as long as you like and take a respite from city living. "I want to give people a good feeling when they're shopping," Crowley says as she places a sign in the window announcing the availability of ice cream.

If Crowley is trying to bring back the old corner drug store, she doesn't have far to go — Huron Drug has been the neighborhood drug store for almost eight decades. While no one knows if it has always been called Huron Drug, everyone knows that a drug store has always been there. In fact, the building the business is in today was built in 1903 expressly to house a drug store.

A Mr. Pipanti opened that first store, later selling it to a Mr. Cooperstein, a pharmacist who died six months later. Cooperstein's widow, Rebecca, continued to run the business until 1966 when Lewis Dorfman took over. For over 35 years,

Dorfman managed Huron Drug, becoming a good friend to many neighborhood families.

When Lew retired in 1981, Roberta Crowley became the store's fourth owner. A pharmacist at Prescription City in East Boston, Crowley learned of the store's sale from the wholesaler who supplied pharmaceuticals to both stores. "It was in their best interest to help Lew find a buyer who would manage the store well," she says today, "they knew me and liked how I managed the store (in East Boston)." Crowley decided to try to buy it. "It was an opportunity I couldn't refuse."

Crowley's offer took some people by surprise. Traditionally, pharmacies have been owned and run by men. Not only did Crowley have to convince the bank to lend her the money, she also had to convince the landlord to give her the lease. It wasn't an easy sell. At age 24, Crowley had never owned a business. While the first bank she approached, Cambridge Trust, turned her down, the bank she did business with while at Prescription City gave her the crucial loan. The Najarians, owners of nearby Fresh Pond Market and the

building's owner, also gave Crowley a chance, turning away a CVS to keep the small neighborhood drug store intact.

Crowley may have been young when she bought Huron Drug, but she has run the store in an old-fashioned way that would make Pipanti proud. To keep Huron Drug's loyal customers happy, Crowley asked Dorfman to stay on to ensure a smooth transition between owners. When Dorfman finally retired seven months later, he left his store in good hands.

Crowley's efforts to keep her customers happy have paid off. She recently enlarged the store by 900 feet, expanding the greeting card, gift section and post office and adding, of course, her dream ice cream parlor. "Sometimes I think I am nuts to open an ice cream parlor," she says. "Maybe all I'm trying to do here is to recapture my youth."

Crowley has turned the clock back for everyone in this little corner of Fresh Pond. If recapturing your youth is what you have in mind, a stroll to Huron Drug might fit the ticket.

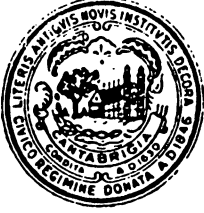

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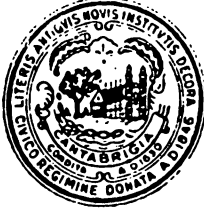

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "The Code of the City of Cambridge."

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter Ten of the Code of the City of Cambridge entitled "Fire Prevention" is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Article V. Fire Department Fee Schedule, as follows:

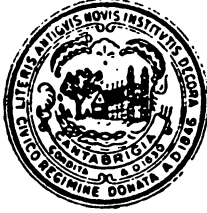

City sues Cellucci on permit

The city has formally filed suit against Inspectional Services Commissioner Joseph Cellucci over the demolition of a controversial building on Putnam Avenue.

Cellucci issued the demolition permit in spite of the fact that the building's rental units had not been removed from rent control and that the city historical commission had not given its approval for demolition.

The city contends that its ordi-

nances require a removal permit from the rent control board before a demolition permit can be issued. It further contends that the historical commission has authority over the fate of the building, since it was more than 50 years old.

Cellucci contends that he has bound by superseding state regulations of the State Board of Building Regulations and Standards.

Cellucci has 20 days to respond, once he has received official notification of the filing of the suit.

Spring tax bills will hurt, city council told

When property tax bills for 1987 are officially issued this spring, there is likely to be countless rate homeowners in Cambridge. The reason: the city's estimated tax levy for this fiscal year will be dramatically higher than last year's, and most homeowners will have to pay a greater share of it, say city officials.

In releasing this bleak news at Monday night's city council meeting, City Manager Robert Healy said that the average residential property value will increase about 40 percent this year. But Healy added that this factor was only part of the total tax bill equation.

Some of the nine council members let it be known that — election year or not — the proposed tax levy and hike represent a substantial burden for many Cambridge homeowners.

"We have a lot of people who are going to have heart attacks when they open their tax bills," City Councilor William Walsh said.

In the wake of Proposition 2½, the average Cambridge property tax bill decreased by seven percent from fiscal years 1981 to 1986, according to an analysis by the city's finance department. Smaller city budgets and a hot commercial economy also played crucial roles in this decrease. But this trend is coming to a halt, said James Maloney, assistant city manager for fiscal affairs.

State auditors are now wrapping up their review of the city's property revaluation. The state's certification process, done every three years, should be completed by early May, Healy said.

"Not only is there a significant increase in the tax levy, there is a significant shift in the levy from commercial to residential taxpayers," Robert Healy, City manager

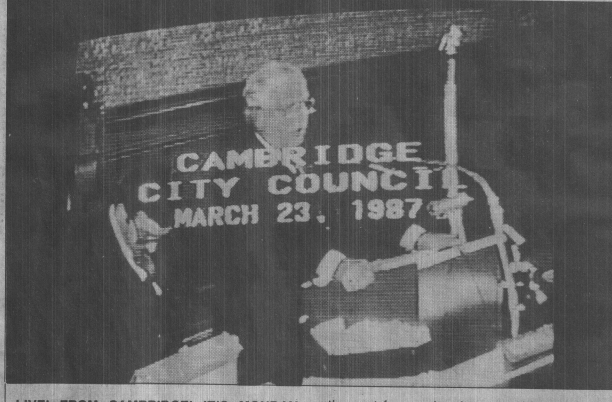
While city officials have yet to determine the actual increases in the property tax bill, they explained the hike primarily stems from required funding for the fiscal year 1987 budget of \$182 million and the state's classification of both residential and commercial property owners.

The extent of the tax hike is only partly influenced by the city's comprehensive property revaluation now nearing completion, Maloney said.

The tax levy for fiscal year 1987 is about \$32.5 million, Healy said. The tax levy for fiscal year 1986 was about \$24.4 million. The tax levy cumulatively increased by only \$6.4 million over the previous five fiscal years. Cambridge Hospital, which operates at a deficit, is the biggest drain on the budget, he said.

But in light of all these factors, how will the estimated tax levy affect property tax bills this year?

Based on the state's classification system, residential property owners paid 38.4 percent of the fiscal year 1986 tax levy. They will have to pay 41.4 percent of the fiscal year 1987 levy.

The upcoming budget for Cambridge Public Schools looks lean, although Superintendent Robert Peterkin remains optimistic.

The school committee passed a \$54.7 million budget for fiscal year 1988 last Thursday, developed by Peterkin and the school staff, with suggestions from parents and others.

There is a \$1.8 million difference between Peterkin's figuring and the revenues available estimated by the city manager, with Peterkin's final figure at \$56.5 million, compared to the city manager's \$54.7 million.

Most of the budget, or 80 percent, goes for salaries, with a big lump to teachers who were given a 6 percent raise last October, during contract negotiations between the Cambridge Teachers' Association and the school committee, according to

Study urges city to spend money from linkage

As Cambridge officials continue to narrow down the options for a new linkage proposal, they also face an equally difficult task: If the city council eventually adopts the proposal, how should the linkage fees obtained from developers be spent?

Last year, for instance, schools were given \$700,000 from the city's hotel-motel tax revenue, and \$500,000 from federal revenue sharing.

Second school panel slot opens

Robins eggs aren't the only things hatching in Cambridge these days, now that spring is officially here. Also incubating is what many believe may be one of the most interesting municipal elections in years.

While city council races usually draw more attention from the press and public alike, this year's school committee race may command equal attention, now that a second incumbent has opted against seeking a new term.

Last week, first term Committee Member Sara Garcia, who is backed by the Cambridge Civic Association (CCA), said she was out of the race. This week, Committee Vice Chair Jane Sullivan, an independent, said she will not seek a fourth term in the fall.

Adding to the increasing interest in the school race is news that city Democratic Chair Clifford Truesdell is seriously pondering a run for the panel as a CCA candidate.

The current school panel is comprised of three CCA members — Garcia, Larry Weinstein and Frances Cooper — and three independents — Sullivan, L Fred Fantini and Tim Toomey Jr. The seventh seat is occupied by Mayor Walter Sullivan, completing an independent majority.

But with two incumbents out of the race, the make-up of the school committee — and its political balance — could be shifted after the votes are counted in November.

Sullivan, daughter of former school panel Member John Brinson Sullivan, said she is leaving the panel to study for a master's degree in business administration from an area university.

"I hope I have been able to give back to the community as much as I have received from it in terms of personal growth and satisfaction," Sullivan said of her six years on the committee.

Cambridgeport downzoning vote set

The Cambridge City Council is expected to vote this Monday, April 6, on a unique Cambridgeport downzoning proposal. The proposal would limit the density of townhouse developments and provide developers with incentives to build affordable housing.

While there seems to be growing council support for the proposal, the Ward Five Democratic Committee this week issued a new Cambridgeport downzoning petition that would be tougher.

The original proposal, which was shaped by the planning board over the past six months, would affect the residential portion of Cambridgeport. The area, which is zoned as a Residence C-1, would be changed to a Residence C, thereby limiting the density of townhouse developments as well as additions to existing neighborhood houses.

The proposal was recently amended by the planning board to provide developers with incentives to build affordable housing.

For example, within the C-1 designation, developers would have the option to build four units on a 5,000-square-foot lot as long as one unit (25 percent) is for affordable housing.

Within the C designation, developers would be allowed to build only two units on the same size lot.

The Ward Five Democratic Committee is evaluating a spectrum of low-to-moderate-income housing developments in Cambridge and Prospect streets in Central Square.

One-way try-out set for Howard St.

After complaining for months about a parking crisis on a strip of Howard street, several Riverside area residents finally got what they wanted from the city last week.
