- WHEREAS: April, 1990, marks the twenty-second anniversary of the Federal Fair Housing Act, Title VIII of 1968, whose passage affects all Americans white and black, rich and poor; and
- WHEREAS: In 1990, the inequalities that President Johnson, civil rights, and housing advocates addressed still exists and although the legislation still exists much of the progress made has been reversed in recent years; and
- WHEREAS: When discrimination continues despite city, state, and federal legislation, it becomes the duty of the city government to encourage every citizen to focus on this issue and to do all they can to fight housing discrimination; and
- WHEREAS: The City of Cambridge has been a leader in efforts to advocate for housing rights and human rights with the creation of Human Rights Commission, a Women's Commission, its Sister City Program, and various legislation; and
- WHEREAS: The City of Cambridge must strengthen its efforts to support housing through legislation and social services; therefore, be it
- RESOLVED: That this City Council proclaim April as Fair Housing Month focusing the efforts of the city, and to read this resolution at the reception to honor Fair Housing Month, and encourage all Cambridge residents to consider the plight of those less fortunate and those who desire equality in their daily lives.
