Re: Sidewalk Snow Clearance

Dear Mr. Healy:

The Cambridge Pedestrian Committee has asked me to express its appreciation for the progress last winter in making Cambridge sidewalks safe for winter travel, and to outline the areas where attention is still needed. Last winter's conditions aptly demonstrated that it is ice as well as snow that can keep pedestrians home-bound, impel them into the street in search of bare pavement, and cause often-debilitating falls.

First the progress, with a few suggestions included:

1. Public information and publicity.

The first professionally-designed snow brochure, produced by the DPW in collaboration with our committee, was sent out with property tax bills and resident parking stickers. Also, Tags Hardware twice sponsored columns in the *Chronicle* that featured sidewalk snow- and ice-removal, and the 24-hour Sidewalk Snow Hotline, 349-4903, was listed in the Boston phone book blue pages.

2. "Priority" sidewalk enforcement.

Sue Clippinger, Director of Traffic, Parking, and Transportation, negotiated a contract to enable Parking Control Officers to hand warning tickets to property owners along some of their normal routes. In the initial experiment, 58 warning tickets were issued on Monday, March 8, 1999.

3. Bus stops.

The DPW began to clear snow from high-traffic bus stops on selected routes. We hope you will provide the resources to do this early in each storm, as icy plow ridges at bus stops are a serious public health hazard for pedestrians of all ages.

4. City-owned sidewalks.

The Pedestrian Committee was delighted to read DPW Commissioner Ralph Dunphy's 12/28/98 memo to you about "a bid contract for snow clearing and removal . . . for snow events of six or more inches." Residents notice the city's slowness to clear its own sidewalks. Please budget funds for timely clearance and sanding of these sidewalks.

5. MBTA subway stations.

In December 1998, at Ms. Clippinger's urging, CDD's Dick Easler developed a list with Jim Monahan (Supt. of Cleaning and Maintenance Systems, MBTA Subway Operations) outlining the snow clearance responsibilities of the MBTA and of the City around T stations. We welcome this step. The list should be regarded as a document-in-progress. For example, Mr. Monahan's welcome commitment to plow and sand the entire Somerville Avenue sidewalk approaching Porter T station, including the Beacon St. RR bridge sidewalks, should be added to the list.

6. Helping homeowners with snow-clearance.

a. Monetary help.

The Council on Aging approved twice the usual number of requests from elderly/disabled homeowners who cannot afford to hire sidewalk shovelers, an increase attributable to the 1998 snow brochure's outreach. The Committee urges that the increased need be matched with increased funds.

b. Help in finding workers.

Many homeowners can afford to pay but cannot find willing, reliable shovelers. The Pedestrian Committee is discussing with the Council on Aging and the DPW how best to assist homeowners looking for shovelers, and how to ensure that shovelers are treated fairly. The COA now gives callers a list of teens it recruits early each winter, but teen and homeowner often find the path to mutual accommodation fraught with difficulty. In this robust economy, most teens who need money have regular jobs, and professional plowers aren't interested in small jobs.

Let me reiterate here the Pedestrian Committee's warm appreciation for the initiative, commitment, and hard work of the departments responsible for the progress described above: Public Works; Traffic, Parking, & Transportation; and Community Development; as well as the Council on Aging.

There is one important area where progress is lacking:

Routine enforcement of the sidewalk snow clearance ordinance is virtually non-existent.

T stations, bus stops, city-owned sidewalks, and business districts are all important. But 75% of Cambridge's 225 miles of sidewalk front houses, small businesses, and institutions in ordinary neighborhoods and yet are critical to reaching bus stops and T stations and grocery stores. The 24-hour Sidewalk Snow Hotline has been amply publicized, but in the past the DPW appears not to have had the staff to take addresses phoned in to the hotline nor to go out at least every 24 hours -- weekends and holidays included -- to confirm that a violation exists before mailing a ticket to the property owner.

Nor did the DPW appear to have had the staff to look up property records. There appears to have been no computerized data system in which to record information about violations by property owner and address in a way that permits tracking compliance over an entire winter -- or several winters. There are probably 50 owners who have received one warning ticket per winter for the last five winters.

Between 25-35% of property owners are chronic scofflaws, rendering critical segments of many neighborhood sidewalks impassable winter after winter. Most of them are simply waiting to see if the City really means what it says about making Cambridge accessible on foot year-round.

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

No one knows whether the present sidewalk snow removal law needs revision because the present ordinance has yet to be fully implemented. It is more than ten years since the ordinance was decriminalized and given to the DPW to enforce. It is more than five years since the 24-hour hotline was installed. Annual notices to property owners have gone out with tax or water bills for four or five years. After several years of ever-more-effective publicity (including many warning tickets), we seem to have reached a compliance plateau.

The time has come for the City to renew its resolve to make Cambridge a pedestrian- and transit-friendly city by committing the monetary, human, and technical resources necessary to enforce the sidewalk snow-clearance ordinance on the books. Thank you for addressing our concerns and for making sure the Pedestrian Committee is a participant in all future discussions of this issue.

We understand that the City is working on a number of these issues, and we look forward to discussing them with Steve White at our January meeting.

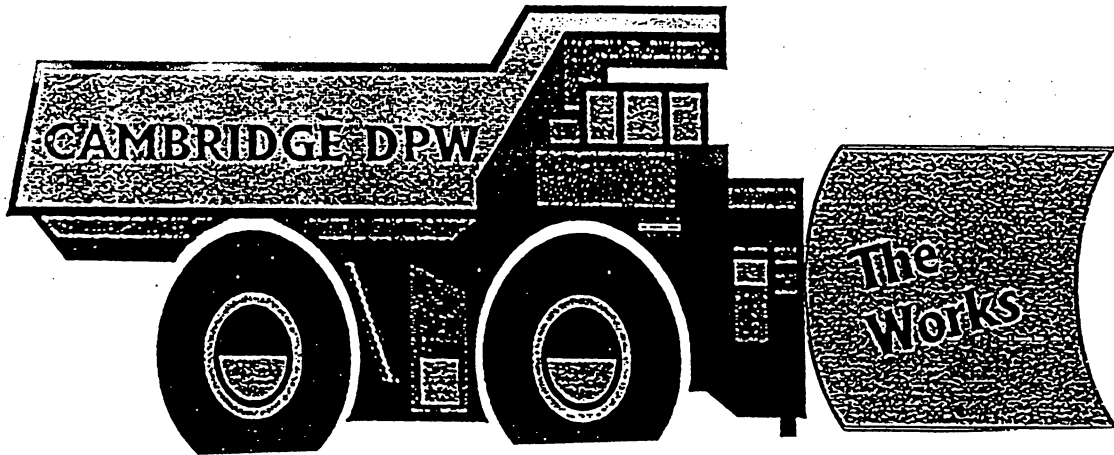

PUBLIC INPUT

The information we receive from the public is extremely valuable to Public Works. This information will be used to improve our services during winter storms to the community.

If you observe or are aware of anything that needs our immediate attention during a storm - please call the hotline at 349-4800 or 349-4860.

If you have any suggestions or recommendations on how we can improve the services please try to call us during normal working hours at 349-4800. During normal working hours we will have the time to give your recommendations and suggestions the appropriate attention.

It is our hope that everyone in the community has a better understanding of Public Works in the clearing of snow and ice.

The information presented is a small part of all the things taking place before, during, and after a storm. We extend an open invitation to all of our residents to seek further information and review of our snow operations. We see your input as putting the "Public back in Public Works"!

HAVE A SAFE WINTER

SIDEWALKS

Property owners and persons responsible for the maintenance of any building bordering a sidewalk are responsible for clearing snow from the sidewalk within twelve hours after snow ceases to fall in the daytime, and before 1PM after a snowfall during the evening. In addition, all ice must be removed from the sidewalk or covered with salt, sand or other suitable substance, within six hours after the sidewalk becomes covered with ice. Failure to comply with this Ordinance will result in a warning for the first violation and a \$25. per day ticket as well as possible liability claims against you and/or your insurance company in the event of a personal injury to a pedestrian. Citizens are encouraged to help enforce this Ordinance by reporting violations to Dan Evans at 349-4830.

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SNOW....THE WINTER CHALLENGE WE SHARE

Snow, snow and more snow is one of the many difficulties facing the citizens of Cambridge each winter. When the winter brings only a foot or two we all have a much easier time of it.


In the recent past, Cambridge has had significant amounts of snow fall on several occasions each winter. This coupled with very high volume of motor vehicle traffic, high density on-street parking, and a dense population, makes snow and ice clearing even more of a challenge. TO THE CAMBRIDGE COMMUNITY

The City of Cambridge, Massachusetts, may not hold the record for more snow annually than any other City its size in New England but our traffic and the snow we do get sets us apart from other cities.

The normal annual snowfall mixed with the amount of traffic and density of population affords us a distinction from other cities. We are also distinct due to the diversity of educational, medical, business, social, historical, and recreational facilities. Due to the commerce and high tech industry we have more than 80,000 commuters driving in and out of our City daily.

The onslaught of snow and ice has a tremendous impact on public safety and essential services. The control and clearing of snow and ice deserves and receives the utmost attention from the Department of Public Works.

The vitality of the City of Cambridge is at stake during the winter season. Because of this the City must have a snow-and ice-control plan that is effective. Commerce and industry suffer when products cannot be shipped, deliveries cannot be made, and services cannot be rendered. Schools which are forced to close due to road conditions cause hardships for working parents who must find alternative care. Recent studies have shown that fuel costs and consumption increase significantly if vehicles must travel through accumulated snow on the pavement. Frequency of accidents, injuries, and deaths will increase without benefit of a comprehensive snow clearing program.

The Department of Public Works feels the snow and ice control plan is of vital importance to the need of senior citizens who are unable to get out to grocery stores, children walking to school, and the thousands of people of all ages that walk to the subway and bus stops on their way to work. The 100,000 people each day in the Cambridge/Boston area that get to work on foot are very important to the DPW. Clear sidewalks are very important to these people and are a major priority to the DPW.

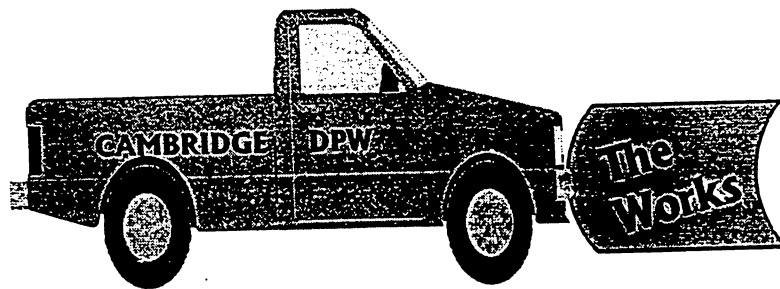
TEAM APPROACH

The Department of Public Works uses a team approach in administering capital and maintenance programs of the Cambridge infrastructure. The team approach ensures that the Divisions within Public Works coordinate with each other as well as with other City Departments.

Each Division within the Department plays a major role in the snow and ice clearing plan. The streets Construction Division must coordinate the parking and snow clearing signing with the Traffic and Transportation Department. During snow emergencies towing of vehicles from restricted areas results from the combined efforts of the Streets Division, Traffic and Parking, and the Police Department. The Vehicle Maintenance Division must ensure that all snow equipment is in good working order. All Divisions supply drivers to operate salting and plowing vehicles. All Divisions provide personnel for hand-shoveling sidewalks, bus stops and building entrances. Inspection Services reports unsafe conditions such as over-hanging snow and ice on buildings next to walkways. Finally, the Administrative Division facilitates the snow clearing program with an ongoing review. This ongoing process includes reviewing research, citizen input, planning, procurement and implementation.

A major part of our team effort is public input. The input we receive is vital in the development of plans for snow and ice clearing that truly meets the community's needs. We encourage your input to keep us up-to-date and welcome new volunteers for our total team effort. We want to put the "public" back in Public Works snow clearing operations.

DPW GOALS

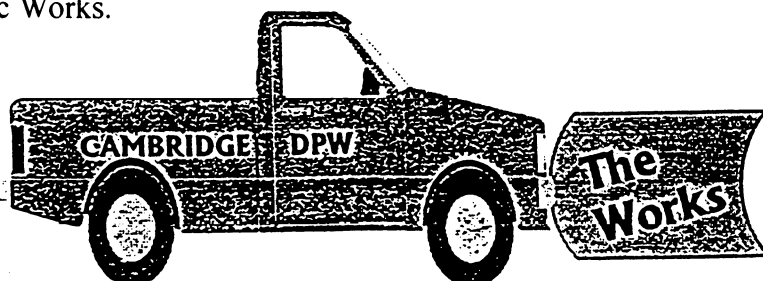
- Place initial applications of salt on all main arteries within three (3) hours of when snow begins.
- Applications of salt will be made at 300 Lbs., or 500 Lbs., per two lane mile as determined by weather conditions. All routes are designed in sequence to treat the most traveled roads first.
- To keep main arteries within the City plowed during all stages of a storm.

To clear all streets and public owned sidewalks in the City once a storm of 1 to 3 inches is completed, or continuous clearing of any storm predicted or greater than 3 inches. All streets must cleared once snow has stopped.

- Keep walks, crosswalks, and corners that the City is responsible for cleared of snow and ice.
- Respond to spot hazards, complaints, and clean up after the storm.
- To assist the walking public by aiding and coordinating, when possible, the actions of citizens, transportation agencies, and businesses in clearing the snow from bus stops, T-Stations, and commercial areas.

Complete the snow and ice clearing in such a fashion that a balance is achieved in maintaining essential services, pedestrian, and safety with the needs of a healthy environment.

- Complete the snow clearing operations in such a fashion that the highest level of service with the minimum amount of inconvenience possible is delivered to the citizens of Cambridge for each storm.
- That we uphold our end of the bargain in the shared responsibilities for winter storms with the public.
- That systems, methods, and procedures of "What We Do In A Storm" includes the public being put back in Public Works.

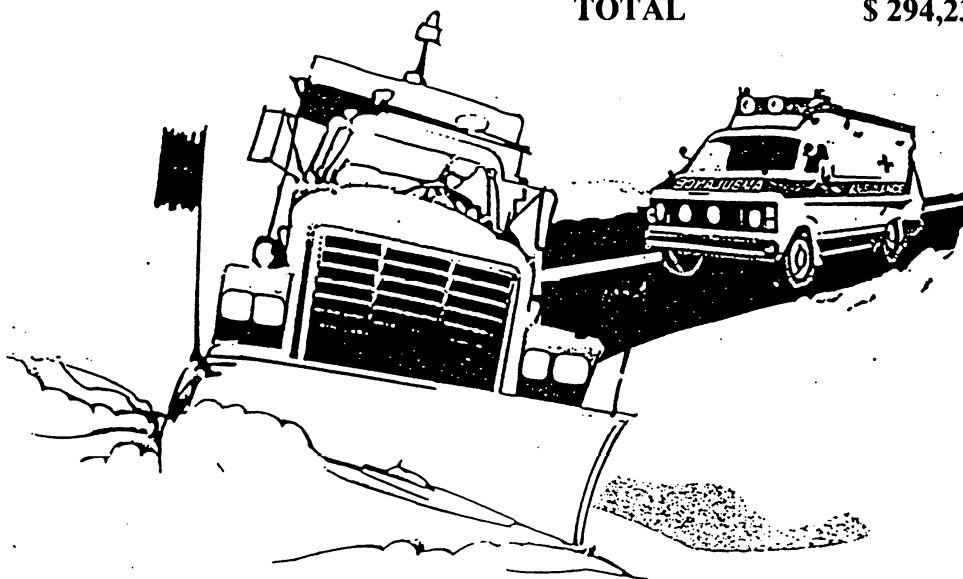

PUBLIC WORKS WINTER PLAN TO SERVE YOU

WHAT WE DO

We constantly maintain equipment and personnel assignments that will ensure a prompt response to changing weather conditions during the winter months.

We monitor the weather by observation and periodic weather reports fed by fax to us 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and maintain contact with supervisors who plan the appropriate response for any inclement condition.

Normally when snow/ice begin to accumulate on the street surfaces in quantities of 1/2 inch or more we begin the salting of arteries and main streets to prevent the buildup of snow and ice.

Plowing the streets may begin where the snow accumulates from 1 1/2 to 3 inches. We must continue the plowing until the snowfall subsides.

When the snow subsides, plowing continues till all the snow is pushed back to the curbs and the corners are cleared.

Clearing of City-owned walks, City building walks, and MBTA bus stops begin when the snow subsides and continues until all the snow is cleared.

After the snow operations are complete, we continue to respond to trouble calls, replenish supplies, and prepare equipment for the next storm.

ORGANIZATION

The City is divided into 4 different sections for snow and ice clearing operations. Each section is divided into several routes. Salting or snow plow crews are assigned specific routes in each section.

Each of the sections has a supervisor that coordinates the efforts of plowing/salting crews in the section.

The section supervisor takes direction from the snow operations manager who is supervised by the Public Works Commissioner.

The Public Works Department maintains communications with the City Manager's staff, Police Department, Fire Department, and the Traffic and Transportation Department throughout winter storms.

WHAT TO EXPECT FROM PUBLIC WORKS

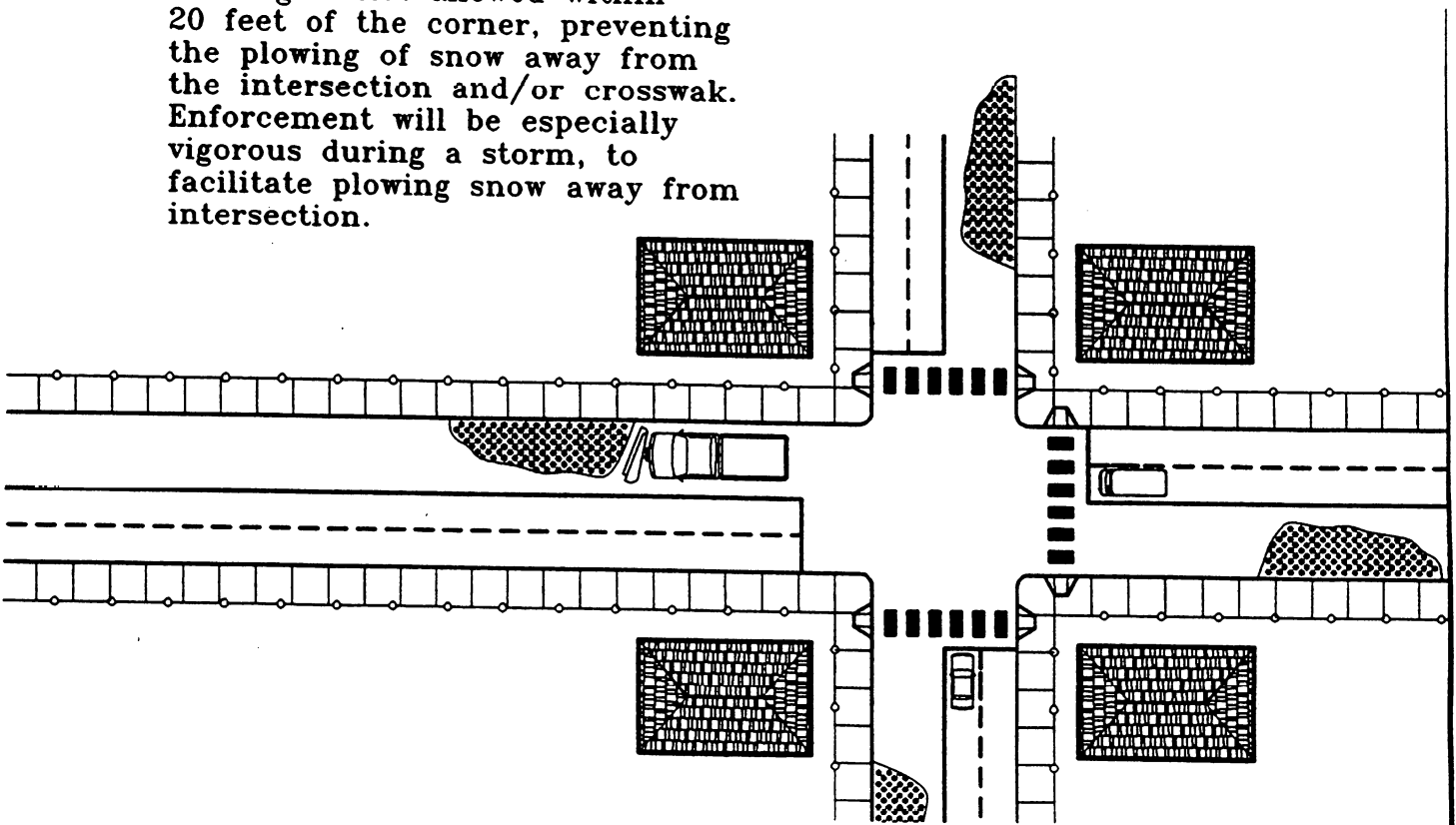
- We will be on the street early in the storm. When snow accumulates to between a half an inch to an inch we will start treating the street. Salting and plowing will not stop till the storm subsides.
- Arteries and main streets receive immediate attention to keep traffic moving and for emergency service vehicles. Operations on secondary streets begin immediately when the arterial and main streets are clear.
- If a "Snow Emergency" has been declared the ticketing and towing of illegally parked vehicles will begin to get the streets cleared for plowing curb to curb.
- Once plowing begins, it must continue till the storm subsides and all the snow is pushed back to the curb. Because we cannot wait until the snow stops to begin plowing, we will "unavoidably" put snow in driveways. We will also plow in parked cars on the streets. This is also unavoidable. If there is any way for us to plow snow and not put it in a driveway or plow a car in - we will!
- Public Works will make every effort to plow snow around corners to insure the corner is kept clear of snow piles. This allows better visibility for motorists and pedestrians at intersections. Plowing the snow around the corner also makes it much easier for property owners to keep the sidewalks clear at the corners.
- Public Works will clear snow from the walks and handicap parking spaces at public buildings and bus stops in busy commercial areas. We will start the clearing as soon as possible and continue till completion.
- Public Works will continue to clear snow from streets and public walks after the storm has subsided. Sometimes this may continue for several days after a storm, especially if we have to wait for parked cars to be moved.
- After the snow begins to melt Public Works will be looking for catch basins that need to be cleared so the water will drain and not freeze in the street. Your assistance in helping us to keep the catch basins clear and flowing is greatly appreciated.
- DPW inspectors and enforcement personnel will work throughout the City to enforce the Sidewalk Snow Clearing Ordinance.

- The City and Public Works will continue to provide all services during and after a storm. If any service is to be curtailed due to a storm the information will be made available to the public via the media (see page titled Winter Storm Information). Services that you can expect to continue include:

- . Garbage and Recycling Collection
- . Water Service
- . Sewer Service
- . Snow Clearing
- . All City Government Services will be provided unless a "Snow Emergency" is called.
- . During a "Snow Emergency" all essential services such as Police, Fire and Public Works are still available.

- Emergency Response - Public Works is prepared to dispatch the necessary snow fighting equipment to any area of the City experiencing an emergency. Snow plows are prepared to lead any emergency vehicle, including ambulances and fire trucks, to and from any area.

Note: Parking is not allowed within 20 feet of the corner, preventing the plowing of snow away from the intersection and/or crosswalk. Enforcement will be especially vigorous during a storm, to facilitate plowing snow away from intersection.



A LOT TO CONSIDER

Winter can be a true test of patience and ability in Cambridge. In the Winter of 1993/1994 we received 96.3" of snow. Our average 10 year mean is 35.0" of snow. The depth of the snow is not the only gauge that should be used when determining how tough a storm can be. The moisture content of the snow, the timing, duration of the storm, freezing rain, blowing snow, and usage of salt, all play a major role in the severity of the ice and snow clearing requirements.

SNOW - WET OR DRY?

Shoveling a driveway a few times makes us keenly aware of the difference in snow weights and compaction properties. Generally speaking we can say that a 10 inch accumulation of dry fluffy snow is easier and cheaper to handle than 5 inches of heavy wet snow. Other problems associated with wet snow include: very slippery conditions, salt usage increases, equipment pushes harder causing equipment fatigue, newly fallen snow freezes. There is nothing worse for poor snow removal results than a heavy wet snow followed by a hard freeze.

TIMING OF THE STORM

Obviously, Mother Nature has total control of when a storm hits. The worst time for a storm is during high commuting periods. If it snows after the evening rush, snow crews normally have ample time to prepare the streets for the commuting hours. But when a storm starts at 6:00 in the morning or 3:30 in the afternoon, motorists and pedestrians need to take extra precaution until crews are able to clear the streets and walks.

DURATION OF A STORM

The faster a storm comes in and leaves the better. Three inches of snow that falls in 24 hours may cost twice as much to clear as six inches of snow that falls in 8 hours. Storms of long duration increase salt use, equipment and employee hours.

FREEZING RAIN

Freezing rain on bare pavement and sidewalks can turn them into an ice skating rink within 10 minutes. It is recommended that you do not drive until you have seen the street treated with salt. Every property owner must either apply salt and/or sand on the sidewalks adjacent to their property in a timely manner.

SALT USAGE

Temperature, moisture, storm duration, timing of storm, and weather after the storm play a major role on the amount of salt used. Dry, fluffy snow at low temperatures may require little use of salt. Wet, heavy snow may account for heavier salt use.

Cars pack snow to the surface of the road making it harder to scrape off. During high commute periods additional salt has to be used.

THE WEATHER FORECAST

A vital service to aid Public Works in our decision making is the use of meteorologists. The City uses both the National Weather Service and a consultant. These services play a vital role in storm planning.



MOST COMMON QUESTIONS AND COMPLAINTS RECEIVED

1. **Snow is pushed into my driveway and by my parked car on the street! Why can't the City remove it?**

Pushing the snow into the driveway opening and along a car parked on the street is really unavoidable. We know of no other City our size in New England that removes snow from residents' driveways or along parked cars on the street. The cost of such a service would be tremendous! DPW crews will try to move snow back to the curb as soon as possible after a storm. During heavy snowfalls, thawing conditions, and storms which require push back after a storm, we will be as careful as possible.

2. **What is a Snow Emergency?**

During the winter months, the City of Cambridge may implement City-wide parking bans. These parking bans are enforced when the City receives notice of snow storms which have predicted accumulations of 6 or more inches of snow, ice, or other inclement conditions. Information on the parking ban may be obtained by calling the Traffic Department at 349-4700.

3. **Does the City really need to call a Snow Emergency and ban parking on the main arteries for snow clearing?**

Yes. Snow must be cleared and pushed back to the curbs. The City may implement City-wide parking bans. These parking bans are enforced when the City receives notice of snow storms which have predicted accumulation of 6 or more inches of snow, sleet, ice or other inclement conditions. During the parking bans the City prohibits parking on both sides of all main streets and arteries. Parking is also prohibited on secondary roads when signs have been posted. (Usually signs are posted one side only).

Calling a "Snow Emergency and Parking Ban" is not taken lightly by the City. Efforts are made to consider all the issues, impacts and alternatives. If the emergency and parking ban is necessary as much prior notice as possible is given. The ban is terminated as soon as possible.

Some thoughts on why a parking ban is necessary include: Snow which is not pushed to the curb has a tendency to be dragged out into the travelway days after a storm causing slippery conditions. Snow not pushed back to the curbs makes it difficult for emergency vehicles, normal traffic, and pedestrians to negotiate the streets and intersections.

Snow not pushed back to the curb makes parking much more difficult. Parking is already difficult in Cambridge. Where the snow is not pushed to the curb cars are parked further and further away from the curbs. Please remember that if a hard freeze follows a snow storm the snow freezes and it cannot be pushed back to the curb.

4. Am I required to clear and remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk that abuts my property?

Yes! Property owners are required to clear and remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk that abuts their property. This includes the front and side if you live at a corner. At a minimum, a pathway wide enough for people walking to pass one another is required. Please, don't forget to clear the corners so people can cross the street.

Every property owner is reminded that the DPW has a "hotline" for the reporting of sidewalks that have not been cleared of snow and ice. The DPW inspectors will ticket properties that fail to clear the walks after a storm.

The DPW considers the safe travel of pedestrians as important as the safe travel of vehicles. It is our intention to give pedestrian concerns the same amount of priority, attention and effort as every other form of travel. We are asking each and every property owner to share in the responsibility of making the sidewalks safe for the travel of our senior citizens, school children and the thousands of people walking to work.

5. Can I park my car on the street during the Winter or during storms?

Yes, but maintain awareness of what the storm is doing and where you are parked. If a Snow Emergency is declared you may need to move your car. The streets are posted with signs for emergencies and include all main streets and arteries. The smaller streets are also posted with signs. We normally clear the streets one side at a time. We also announce the emergency and parking ban by radio and television public service announcements ahead of time.

6. Will my car be towed?

Yes, if you are parked on a main street, one of the arteries, or a residential street posted for clearing, your car will be ticketed and towed.

Remember, we will announce via the media that a snow emergency and parking ban has been declared. The announcement is normally made several hours before the ban is implemented.

7. What should I do if a snow plow damages my property?

Please report the damages to the City Law Department at 349-4121, Monday through Friday, 9AM to 4PM. Be prepared to provide the following information: description of DPW vehicle and the property (car) damaged, location and estimated time of accident. All the DPW vehicles have large black numbers on the front and rear for easy identification. Upon receipt of a report we will investigate the position of our vehicle. After the investigation the Law Department will be in contact with you.

8. How do I report a snow plow that is traveling too fast or being unsafe?

Our plows and salters are directed to plow between 5 and 20 M.P.H. and sometimes slower. If you believe speeds are in excess of safe conditions, please contact us giving us the location, description of the vehicle (look for the black numbers on the front and rear), and time. We will investigate accordingly.

Contractors plowing for the City of Cambridge will have signs attached to the front doors of the truck indicating they are working for the City. When reporting a contractor's vehicle, provide as much information as possible.

9. Do sidewalks receive the same consideration as streets?

Yes. However, we do not start clearing the publicly-owned sidewalks at the same time as we do the streets. The streets require much more effort to clear and require all our effort early in the storm. DPW clears public owned sidewalks at public facilities.

Remember - property owners are required to clear the snow from walks abutting their property including access to the street and corners!

10. Can I, as a resident or business, push snow from my property onto the sidewalk or street?

No. A City Ordinance restricts this act. Pushing snow from private property onto the street or sidewalk is a violation of the City Ordinance and may bring liability if an accident is caused by this type of activity. This practice creates dangerous situations for pedestrians and the motoring public.

11. Do some streets get a higher priority for clearing during a storm?

Yes. When a storm starts, main streets and arteries and other high use streets are cleared first due to high traffic volume. We implement clearing on other streets as soon as possible (normally within a few hours).

Please keep in mind that early in a storm streets often receive a salt treatment. The salt treatment may not be obvious to you.

If you would like more information on your particular street, contact us at 349-4800. We would be pleased to meet with you to review our overall clearing plan and how it affects you.

Finally, if you are unhappy with the snow and ice clearing on your street please report it. We will make every effort to get back to that location within 24 hours after the storm has subsided.

12. Does the City intend to tow all the parked cars in the City?

No. We will have cars towed and ticketed that are illegally parked during "Snow Emergency". The streets that towing will take place on all have signs posted. We will ticket and tow those cars that are illegally parked and interfere with the snow clearing operations to make the streets safe and passable. We will not ticket and tow vehicles that are legally parked. Cars parked within twenty (20) feet of a corner in any direction during a snow storm will be ticket and towed.

13. Who towed my car? When was it towed? How do I get my car?

Every vehicle towed must be ticketed prior to towing. Each illegally parked vehicle will have been issued a parking violation, and each towing operation will be personally supervised by an appropriate representative from the Cambridge Police Department.

The vehicle will be towed to a specified storage area. The towed vehicle shall be stored in a fenced-in property of the tow company. The registered owner of any vehicle towed under this contract shall receive notice from the contractor no later than 48 hours after towing, by certified mail, return receipt requested, that the vehicle was towed and stored. The notice shall also include the tow charge and per day storage charge.

The registered owner of the vehicle may also call the Cambridge Police Department, (Front Desk) at 349-3301 obtain information on towed vehicles.

Provisions have been made so that owners who are towed may pay and claim their vehicle 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Payments shall be accepted in the form of cash, credit card or guaranteed check.

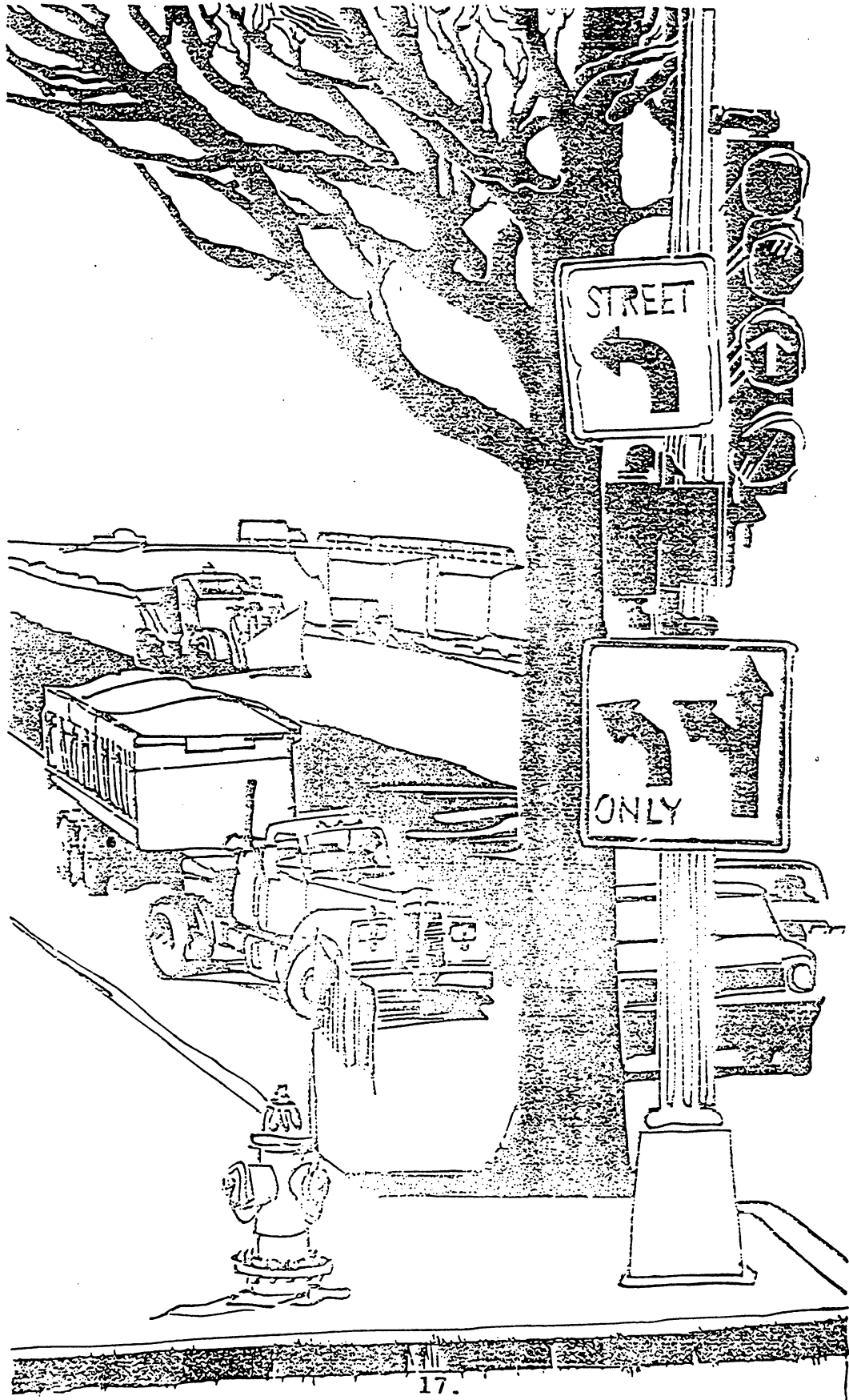

WINTER "DO'S AND DON'TS"

DO'S

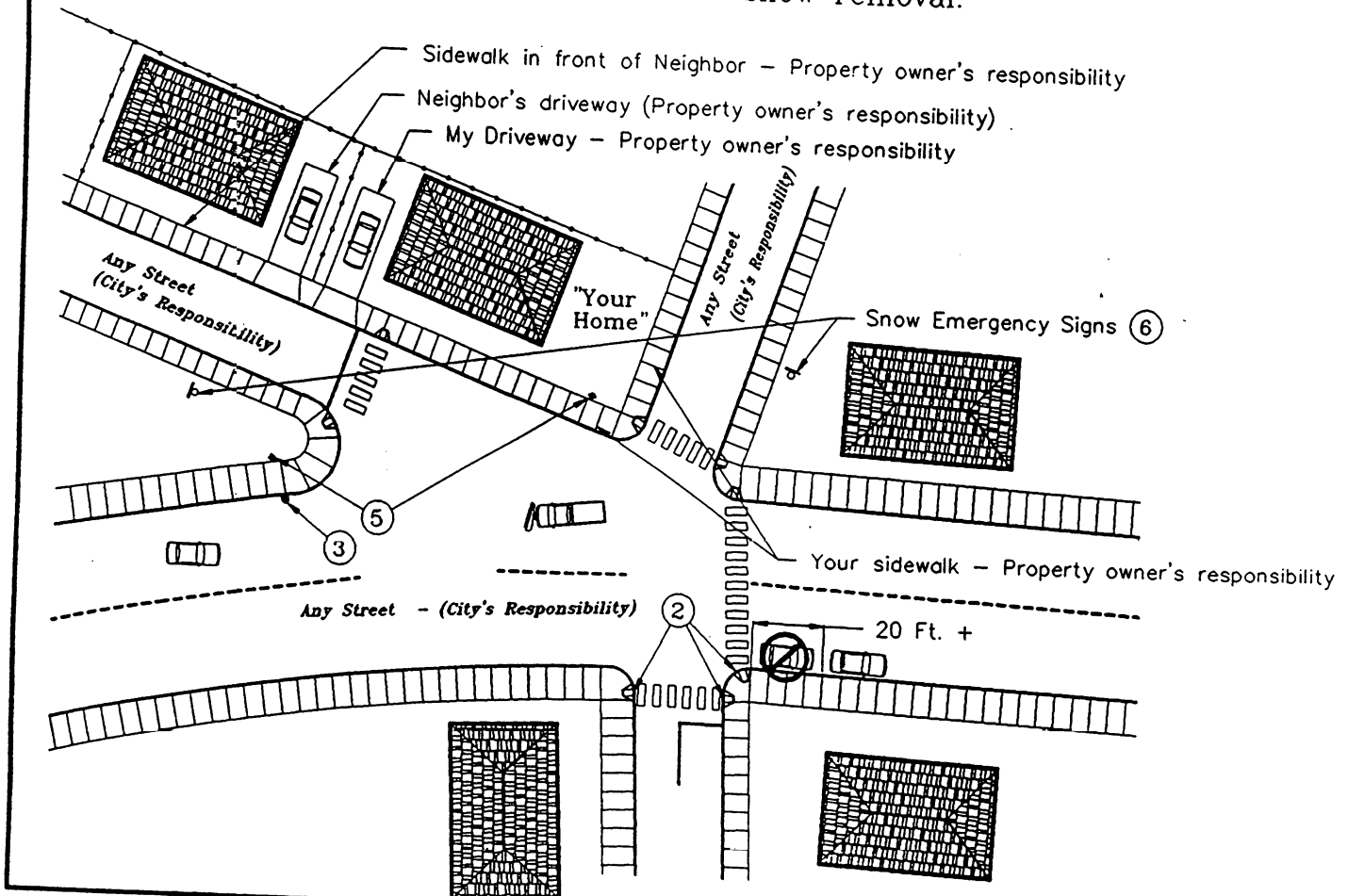
- Do clear the sidewalk around your property. This includes the corner.
- Do shovel the snow from your driveway onto the side of your property.
- Do remove your car from the street if an emergency is declared.
- Do move your car if you want the snow to be plowed to the curb.
- Do clean off the catch basins when you clear the sidewalk. Your effort will be appreciated.
- Do sand your sidewalks as soon as ice forms so your neighbors can get to the store & bus safely.
- Do use salt to help melt the ice on the walks - when possible.
- Do clear a pathway on the sidewalk that will accommodate the handicapped. The cleared path should be 36" to 42" wide (width of wheel chair).
- Do clear the snow & ice from the handicap ramps at the corner.
- Do clear your walk so that two people can pass each other.
- Do shovel your snow off the walk to the snow at the curb.
- Do practice safety.

DON'TS

- Don't throw the snow from the walks and driveways into the street.
- Don't throw snow from your car onto the cleared part of the street or sidewalk.
- Don't start clearing the walks and driveways before it stops snowing.
- Don't dig the windrow of plowed snow away from your car until the snow stops and the streets are plowed. Let us get most of the snow in the streets plowed first.
- Don't forget to clear the snow from your walk. The school children, the elderly, and the handicapped count on you.
- Don't pile snow up at the corners. Pedestrians need to cross the street.

Here's How You Can Help.

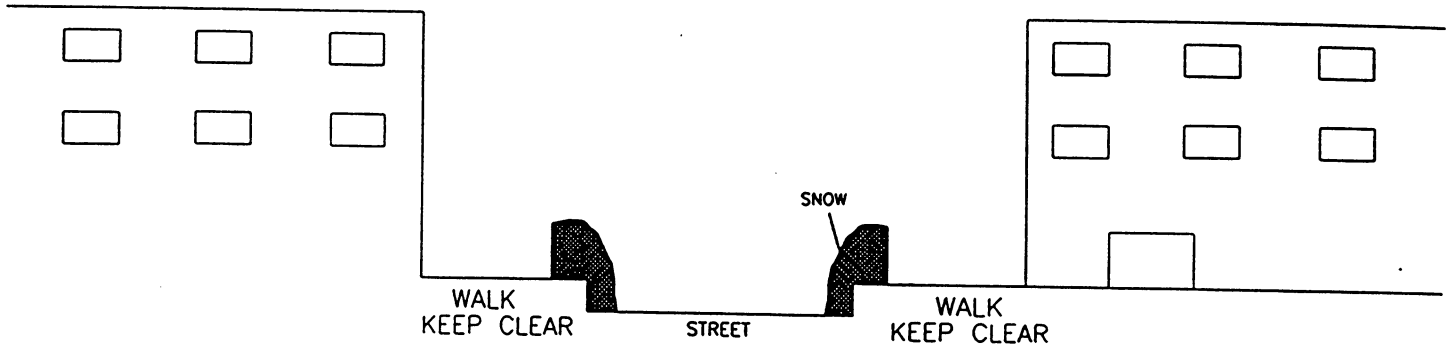
1. - Keep your sidewalk clear of snow and ice.
2. - Clear openings at street corners, so pedestrians can cross.
3. - Clear snow from all catch basins.
4. - If you don't have a driveway, make sure you park your car at least 20' or more from the corner of a street.
5. - Help the firefighters by clearing fire hydrants.
6. - Don't forget what side of the street is designated as a "No Parking" zone during snow emergencies.
7. - Be sure to call 349 - 4903, day or evening, to report the address of unshoveled, or icy to the D.P.W. enforcement unit.

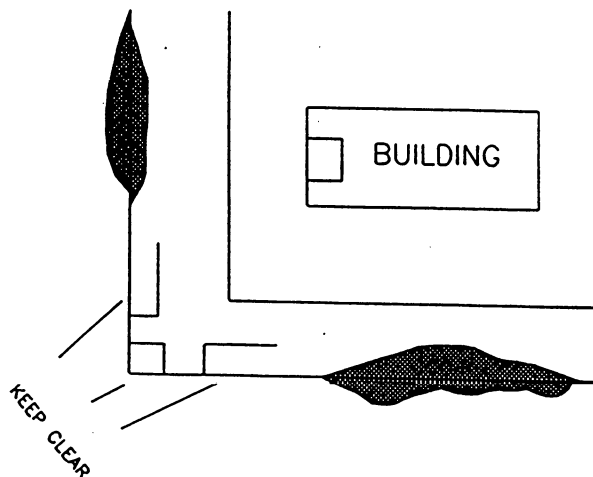

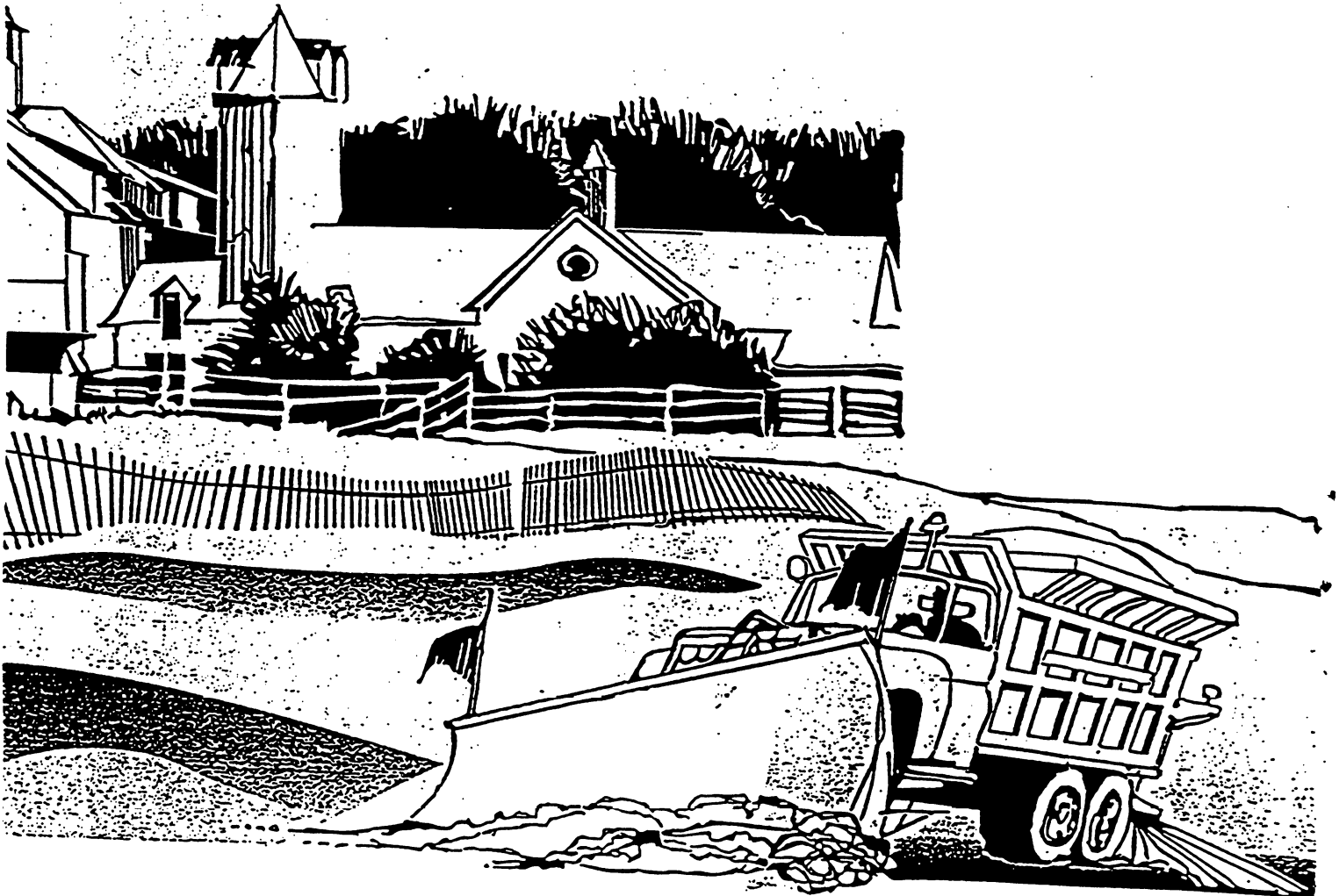

SHARING A DRIVEWAY

If you are fortunate enough to have a driveway - Why not consider sharing it with your neighbor during snow storms. Parking cars in driveways means":

- Fewer cars on the street and the street is easier to plow to the curb.
- If an emergency is declared, fewer cars have to be moved off the street and fewer cars will be subject to towing.
- Your neighbors can help you shovel your driveway.
- You are a good neighbor!

REMEMBER TO SHOVEL ALL SIDEWALKS

Property owners and persons responsible for the maintenance of any building bordering a sidewalk are responsible for clearing snow from the sidewalk within twelve hours after snow ceases to fall in the daytime, and before 1PM after a snowfall during the evening. In addition, all ice must be removed from the sidewalk or covered with salt, sand or other suitable substance, within six hours after the sidewalk becomes covered with ice. Failure to comply with this Ordinance will result in a warning for the first violation and a \$25 per day ticket as well as a possible liability claims against you and/or your insurance company in the event of a personal injury to a pedestrian. **Citizens are encouraged to help enforce this Ordinance by reporting violations to 349-4903.**

During the winter months, the City of Cambridge may implement city-wide parking bans. These parking bans are enforced when the City receives notice of snow storms which have predicted accumulations of 6 or more inches of snow, sleet, ice or other inclement conditions.

THE REASONS FOR PARKING BANS

- Reduces snow plowing costs 20-30 percent per storm
- Allows snow to be pushed directly to the curb which results in
 - a) wider streets & roadways during winter months for driving and on-street parking
 - b) open roadway drainage systems
 - c) reduced snow removal costs
- Removal of on-street obstructions allows for faster plowing speed, thereby decreasing plowing response time and culminating the possibility of unplowed streets
- Allows faster movement of emergency vehicles (fire, medical and police units) during winter storms
- Reduces property damage to private and municipal equipment

PARKING BAN NEWS

The City of Cambridge will give public notices of an impending parking ban utilizing the following methods:

- Winter parking ban telephone line - 349-4700
- Radio & television announcements on Boston's commercial broadcasting stations, and on Cambridge Public Access television system (Cable TV-channel 37)

• During snowstorm parking bans, the City of Cambridge prohibits parking on both sides of all main streets and arteries. Parking is also prohibited on secondary roads where signs have been posted. (Usually signs are posted on one side only)

PARKING

It is unlawful to reserve curb parking by setting up barriers, old chairs, trash barrels, or any other placeholder on the street or sidewalk. This practice is against City Ordinances which prohibits obstruction and littering of public ways.

It is very difficult to keep the streets clear of snow and ice in Cambridge due to the density of the City, its narrow streets, traffic volume and lack of street parking. Placing barriers in the street to reserve a parking place severely hinders the Department of Public Works' ability to keep the streets safe for vehicular and pedestrian travel.

Therefore, it will continue to be the practice of the Department of Public Works to pick up these barriers and dispose of them on a daily basis. The City will not take responsibility for these barriers being disposed of after they are removed.

Parking within twenty feet of any corner has a tremendous negative impact on clearing snow. Plows cannot take the snow away from the corner because the cars are in the way. If the plows cannot move the snow away from the corner the snow piles make clearing the walks and handicap ramps next to impossible. You should never park within 20 feet of any corner. This is especially critical when it snows.

Catch basins clear of snow, ice and debris are very important in the winter. The catch basins must be kept clear to allow melting snow and ice to flow and drain. Residents can help by assisting us in keeping the catch basins clear of the snow, ice and debris. This is especially important when catch basins are being parked on the majority of the time. If the water cannot drain it will freeze making large areas hazardous. Your cooperation in helping us keep the catch basins clear is greatly appreciated.

You may report a catch basin problem, by calling 349-4800. Please be prepared to provide the location of the catch basin in reference to the nearest address. This will enable us to provide a quick response to the problem area.

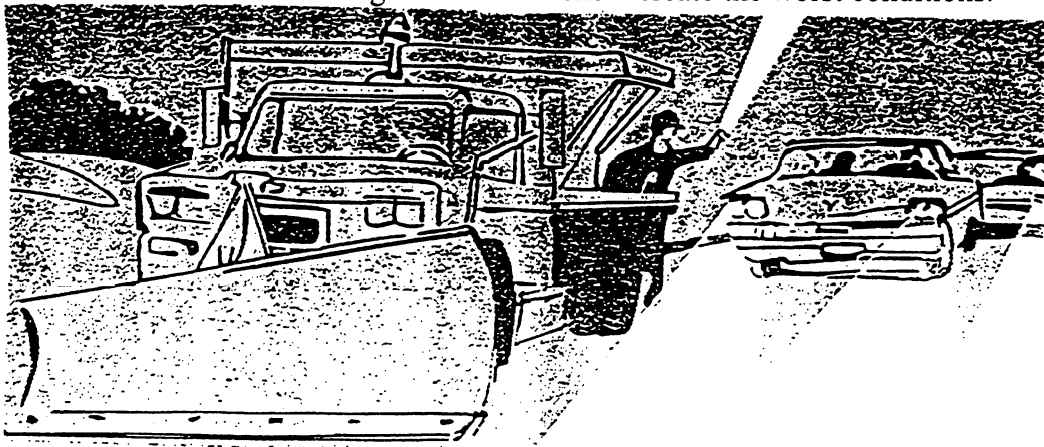

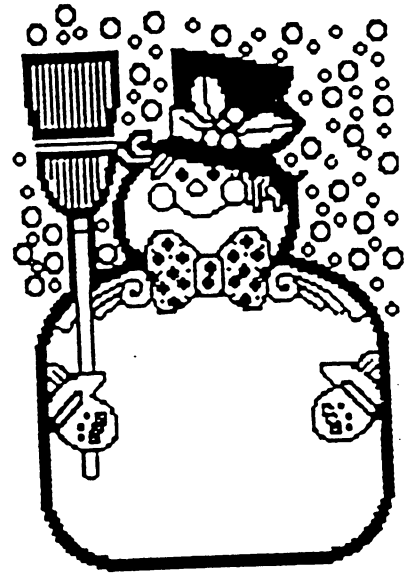
TIPS ON SURVIVING THE WINTER

- * Keep your sidewalk shoveled and sanded.
- * Dig out openings to the street at corners so pedestrians can safely cross the street.
- * Use the MBTA whenever possible.
- * Ensure your vehicle is properly equipped for the winter.
- * Respect parking restrictions during the winter months.
- * Respect the snow emergency when announced.
- * Do not obstruct sidewalks with snow brushed from your car or shoveled from your driveway.
- * Drive courteously and according to road conditions. Watch out for the safety of pedestrians.
- * Expect the unexpected - icy spots, children playing in snow banks, sliding cars, and narrow streets
- * Pay attention to the weather forecasts
- * Remember freezing rain and wet snow create the worst conditions.

Snow removal exemption list - residential areas

The Cambridge Council on Aging (COA) screens applicants for and maintains a list of Cambridge residents with disabilities who qualify for an exemption from the City's requirement that they clear snow and ice from sidewalks bordering their property.

1. Such exemptions are only granted to low-income residents with disabilities who do not have household members capable of clearing snow.
2. Eligibility for snow clearing exemption is determined solely by the Council on Aging on a case-by-case basis, following its established eligibility determination procedures.
3. Eligibility for snow clearing exemption is not automatically available for any broad class of persons, such as all elderly persons over the age of sixty.
4. COA screens new applicants throughout the year and annually reviews each residential exemption to determine if the household still qualifies for such exemption.
5. Once a snow clearing exemption is granted by the COA, it will **remain in effect until the end of the snow season**, unless the COA revokes said exemption.

At sidewalks bordering residences where such snow clearing exemptions have been granted, DPW will clear snow and ice sufficient to maintain a minimum 36 inch wide continuous clear pathway along the entire length of the sidewalk bordering the exempt property and sufficient to maintain a 36 inch wide access aisle to the street.

1. Such snow and ice clearing should be confined to the bordering sidewalks only, and will not include private walkways, stairs, porches, driveways or other parking areas (accessible or otherwise) or any other private property.
2. In extreme weather conditions, residents with snow clearing exemptions are asked to have patience and to understand that DPW's first priorities are to clear snow from major arteries and from public schools and other municipal buildings.
3. In cases where exempt households have questions regarding snow removal, they should call the COA (349-6220) during business hours or to call DPW Hotline (349-4903) during non-business hours.

Business areas

In business areas, business owners should clear snow and ice from sidewalks and curb cuts within the boundaries of the business property. Public walks bordering the business must be cleared to a minimum 36 inch wide continuous clear pathway next to the building.

In business areas, business owners should clear snow and ice from each of the off street parking areas over which the building owner owns or otherwise exercises control as follows:

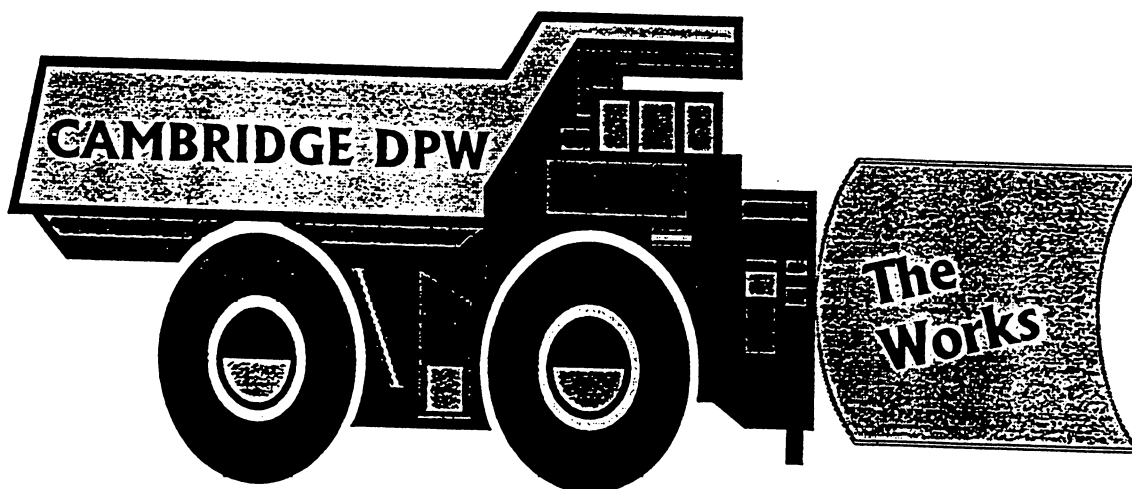
- 1 Snow and ice should be completely cleared from all accessible parking spaces.
- 2 Snow and ice should be completely cleared from all access aisles adjacent to the accessible parking spaces.
- 3 Snow and ice should be cleared wherever necessary to maintain a minimum 36 inch wide continuous clear pathway from each of the accessible parking areas to the building entrance.
- 4 Businesses must take care to see that their parking lot plowing contractor does not leave plow ridges blocking sidewalks. Property owners will be ticketed and fined for sidewalks blocked in this way.

In business areas, where on-street accessible parking is provided proximate to businesses, snow and ice should be cleared by the business owner up to and including the curbstone at such spaces, to allow for persons with mobility impairments to safely enter and exit.

PARKS

Most of the City Parks facilities are closed during the winter months and especially during winter storms. However, the walkways around parks and in some cases walkways going through a park are cleared by Public Works Crews. Play areas and areas that have special safety surfaces are not cleared during the winter. The clearing of the walkways around the parks normally begins shortly after the storm subsides or before daybreak. Areas that receive the most pedestrian traffic receive the highest priority for clearing with the other areas being next.

Public Works considers the clearing of walkways for pedestrian use a high priority. We will begin clearing of walks when the storm subsides and concurrently with the clean up of streets and intersections. In other words.....we will not wait for all the streets to be cleaned before we start on walks.

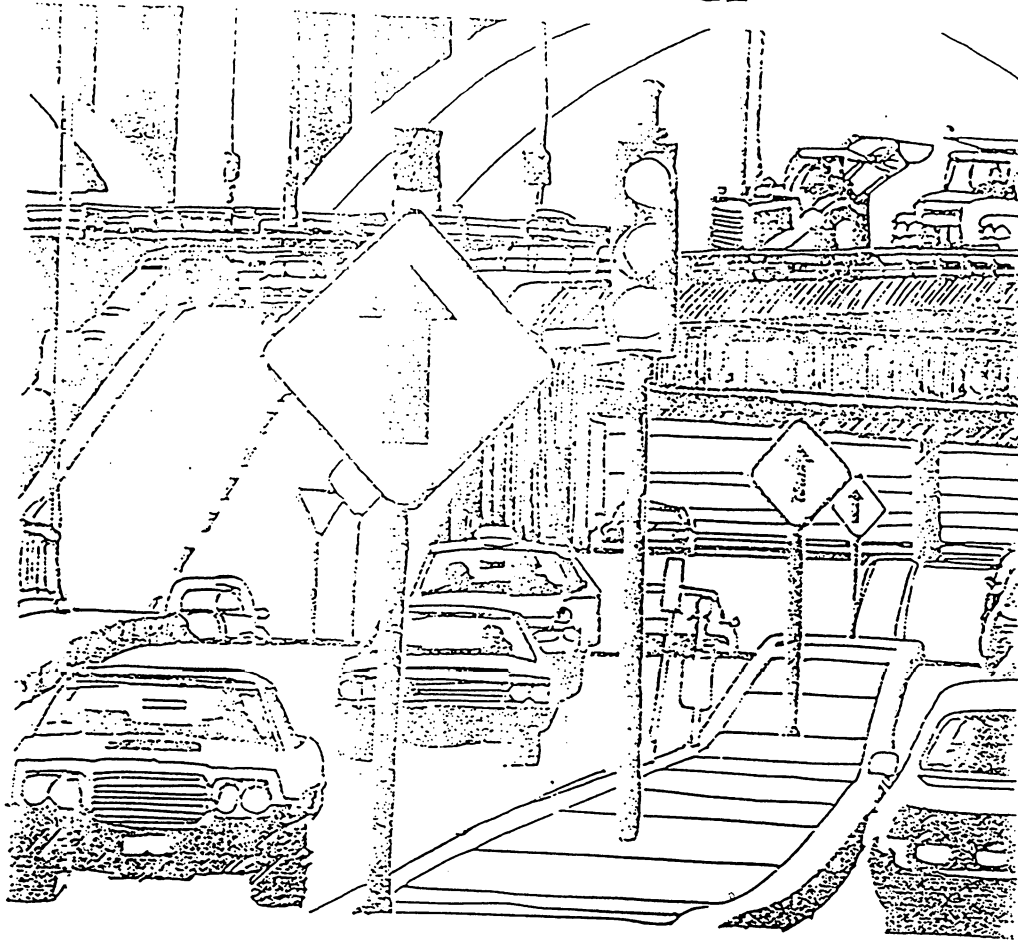

CITY ORDINANCE

12.16.040 SIDEWALKS-RIDING/DRIVING

NO PERSONS SHALL DRIVE, RIDE, WHEEL OR DRAW ANY VEHICLE ACROSS A SIDEWALK EXCEPT ON A DRIVEWAY DESIGNED FOR THE PURPOSE OF PASSAGE OF VEHICLES, AND NO PERSON SHALL USE FOR ACCESS OF ANY VEHICLE TO A SIDEWALK ANY LOG, SKID BLOCK, BRICKS OR ARTICLES PLACED IN THE GUTTER OR STREET; PROVIDED THAT THIS SECTION SHALL NOT APPLY TO CHILDREN'S CARRIAGES OR SLEDS CONTAINING CHILDREN AND DRAWN BY HANDS. (ORD.

1092(PART), 19899:PRIOR CODE S2-39)

RE: **INSTRUCTIONS AND PROCEDURES FOR
SALTING AND SNOW REMOVAL
OPERATIONS**

I. General

1. The Duty Supervisor's name is on the salting rotation list. The Off Hours Supervisor shall immediately notify the Duty Supervisor of all updated weather conditions.
2. Weather forecasts shall be posted in the Radio Room daily and a copy shall also be posted in the Foreperson's Room. Copies of the weather forecasts shall be given to the Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner, and the Superintendent of Streets and the Duty Supervisor as they come in. A copy of the weather forecast shall be faxed to the City Manager's Office. Off Hours personnel will designate someone to fax copies of weather reports to City Manager's Office.
3. In the case of a snow alert, as determined by the Duty Supervisor, Forepersons shall be notified, as well as, Operators and Mechanics. They shall report immediately to the Yard and shall sign in upon their arrival.
4. During salting or plowing operations, any vehicle that breaks down or which has severe mechanical or safety problems shall immediately be reported to a Supervisor or Foreperson. The Supervisor or Foreperson shall immediately contact the Mechanic in Charge and inform him of the problem. It is the responsibility of the Mechanic in Charge to indicate to the Supervisor or Foreperson that the repair is completed. The Supervisor will then contact the driver of the recently repaired vehicle and assign him duties immediately.
5. The Yard must be kept open during Snow Operations in order to accommodate the delivery of salt and sand. Receipts for salt and sand shall be forwarded to the Parks Department for record keeping purposes.
6. The Water Department shall be contacted for use of their vehicles as appropriate and necessary during Salting/Plowing Operations as well as Danehy Park Pick Up Truck #1.

II. Salting Operations

1. During Salting Operations the Snow Duty Supervisor shall assign one Highway Foreperson and two Working Forepersons according to a rotating schedule for the winter months.
2. The Forepersons shall be responsible for insuring that the Individual Work Order Forms are issued for each Operator .
3. Forepersons shall ensure that Salting Units have the gate opened to the correct height, depending on the type of storm. Normally this means that the opening shall be no more than from 1" to 1 1/2" for snow and 1" for sleet. If more salt is needed, check with the Duty Supervisor or the Superintendent of Streets. (Remember that an excessive application of salt is not necessary and will cause harm to the environment.)
4. It is the responsibility of the Forepersons to be in their designated sections to check the vehicles and their routes. The Forepersons are responsible for ensuring that all Operators are properly applying salt and calcium chloride as directed.
5. Each salter truck must have a plastic route map and an Individual Equipment\Material Cost Form before leaving the Yard, and each Operator shall be assigned a specific salt route by the Duty Supervisor.
6. All Forepersons shall be certain that they have fuel cards for the equipment assigned to them and that they have a key to the Sherman Street Gate when loading salt and sand there.
7. Operators and Mechanics shall assist in the mounting of Salters, day or night.
8. Salters are not to be left out in the Yard unless under specific order of the Forepersons or Duty Supervisor.
9. Salters are to be washed according to the assignments under the direction of the Duty Supervisor.
10. All Operators shall fuel the vehicles and perform a circle check both before and after their shift.
11. All vehicles shall notify Snow Base via radio their time of departure. Dispatcher will enter in his log. If problems are experienced, the Foreperson should be notified and the problem repaired.

12. Salt gates shall be adjusted so as to not to waste salt. Salt lanes should be adjusted so the street is covered without hitting cars parked on the side.
13. The underbody scrapers shall be used under the direction of the Duty Supervisor. At this time the first scrape should be in the center or crown of the street.
14. All streets shall be treated with salt or calcium chloride when directed by the Duty Supervisor. If it becomes necessary to change this procedure, Forepersons will alert all trucks.
15. Forepersons may use personnel on all shifts as required.
16. All Personnel called in to operate a salter must report to the Streets Division Office in the rear of the Ryan Building and sign in on the time sheets provided. When any staff leave the Yard and their tour of duty is finished, they shall sign out.
17. Personnel shall not leave their assigned Duty Station or Route until directed by their supervisor.
18. It is the responsibility of the Forepersons and Salt Operator/ Loading Operator to keep a tally on the number of loads of salt and/or sand used for each truck.

III. Snow Plowing Operations

1. During Snow Plowing Operations each Snow Plowing Section shall be staffed by One Supervisor and One Highway Foreperson, and two Working Forepersons as required, who shall be responsible for work being done in the various sections (including the use of Contract Equipment). The Foreperson shall be responsible for assuring that a Work Order slip is issued to each Operator.
2. Plowing the eight (8) routes shall go into effect under the direction of the Duty Supervisor.
3. When it becomes necessary to call in Contractors to do plowing, the trucks shall be sent directly to the district and told to report to the Supervisor in that area:
 - a. Time slips shall be made out for Contract Equipment to record the exact time that they begin and end their work.

- b. Each Contract piece of equipment shall have door signs attached to both the front doors by the Supervisor of each section.
- c. It shall be the responsibility of the Section Supervisor to complete Work Orders with the tasks and hours supplied by Contractors in their Sections.

IV. Salting and Snow Plowing Operations

It will be the responsibility of all employees who are called in during snow operations to sign in upon arrival and sign out on departure. In addition, all equipment operators are responsible to sign in and out for all fuel cards, radios, work order slips and safety boxes.

V. Snow Shoveling Operations

1. The Duty Supervisor shall assign a Highway Foreperson to organize crews that will be responsible for shoveling and/or salting and sanding sidewalks in front of Municipal Buildings, Schools, Bridges, Parks and Open Spaces and the homes of residents on the snow exemption list. The Highway Foreperson shall be responsible for assuring that a Work Order Slip is issued to each crew.
2. Municipal Buildings and School sidewalks shall be cleared to a minimum of three feet in width.
3. Handicapped Parking Spaces and ramps in front of Municipal Buildings, Schools, and in Commercial Areas must be kept clear of all snow and ice. All Handicapped Ramps must be kept clean and checked periodically.
4. The Duty Supervisor will notify the Traffic Department when it is necessary to clean Municipal Parking Lots, sidewalks and other City owned property.

VI. Post Storm Procedures

1. It is the Highway Foreperson's responsibility to ensure that all vehicles and spreaders are washed and cleaned inside and out of salt, sand, and other debris, and to be certain that they are ready for the next storm. Further, it is the Highway Foreperson's responsibility to ensure that the Garage and DPW Yard are clean of all salt and sand.
2. All Operators shall report any mechanical failures and problems to the Master Mechanic in writing on their vehicle checklists.

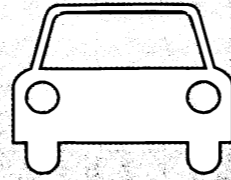
3. The Duty Supervisor shall check all Sign-in Sheets to determine which personnel were used and in order to properly record the correct overtime hours, etc.
4. There will be a debriefing by the Duty Supervisor with all snow emergency personnel to discuss the events of the storm.
5. The Section Supervisor shall be responsible for checking and preparing all time sheets in order to account for all of the Contracting Equipment used during and after a storm.

Snow, Our Winter Challenge
A Guide for Cambridge Property Owners and Residents

It's the neighborly thing to do.

Cambridge is committed to being a walkable city - even when it snows. Snow and ice make walking difficult for everyone, especially school children, mail carriers, elders, and T riders. In Cambridge almost everyone walks sometime.

As a property owner, you should:

- Remove snow from all sidewalks next to your property or business within 12 hours after snow stops falling in the daytime, and before 1 PM when the snow has fallen during the night.
- Clear ice off sidewalks, or treat it with an ice-melting substance within 6 hours of the time it forms.
- Arrange for someone else to keep your sidewalks clear of ice and snow, if you go out of town.
- Dig out fire hydrants and catch basins.
- Always park your car at least 20 feet from the corners so plows can push snow away from crosswalks.
- If your home or business is on a corner, make openings in snow banks between the streets and sidewalks at crosswalks, street corners, and bus stops. Don't forget to shovel the side street sidewalks as well as the sidewalk in front of your business or home.
- If you are next to a crosswalk, please shovel an opening wide enough for a wheelchair-bound person to get through.

Enforcement.

Violations of this ordinance are handled by the Public Works and the Traffic, Parking and Transportation Departments. Enforcement will be greatly increased this year through the help of the Traffic Parking Control Officers. The fine for violation of this ordinance is \$25.

The Department of Public Works will:

Clear the streets as soon as possible. Our goals are to chemically treat all major arteries within 3 hours of when snow begins, starting with the most-traveled roads, to keep main arteries plowed during throughout a storm, and to clear all streets and the sidewalks bordering city property once a storm has stopped.

Please don't take it personally

Pushing snow into a driveway opening or along a car parked on the street is often unavoidable as we work to keep streets passable. Don't throw snow from your sidewalks or driveway into the street, it's against the law! Don't leave old chairs, trash bags, or other objects in on-street parking spaces - they will be hauled away!

About that ice

Stock up on ice melter before a storm. Use ice melter with calcium chloride. It's better for the environment and you only need a little. Avoid rock salt, it kills plants and trees. Avoid sand as it's expensive to clean up in the spring and fills catch basins and storm drains.

Snow Exemption Program, Council on Aging 349-6220.

If you are elderly, disabled, or a homeowner with a low income you may qualify for the City's Snow Exemption Program. If you qualify, the Department of Public Works will shovel your sidewalk. To apply call the Council on Aging 349-6220. The Council on Aging can also provide you with a list of students who want to earn money by shoveling (you contact the student and negotiate a price) or a list of professional snow removal companies.

Sidewalk Hotline 349-4903

Call the Sidewalk Hotline anytime to report uncleared sidewalks. All you need is an accurate address. After a DPW inspector confirms a violation, a ticket is issued to the property owner.

Snow Emergency Parking Ban 349-4700

When the City declares a snow emergency, you can **not** park on the major streets where there are snow emergency signs or on one side of smaller streets as signed. Cars will be ticketed and towed to allow the plows to clear the snow back to the curb. You can find out when a ban goes into effect and when it will be lifted by calling 349-4700 or from your local radio or TV news station.

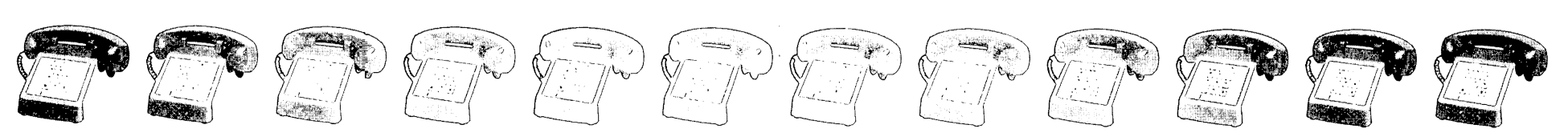

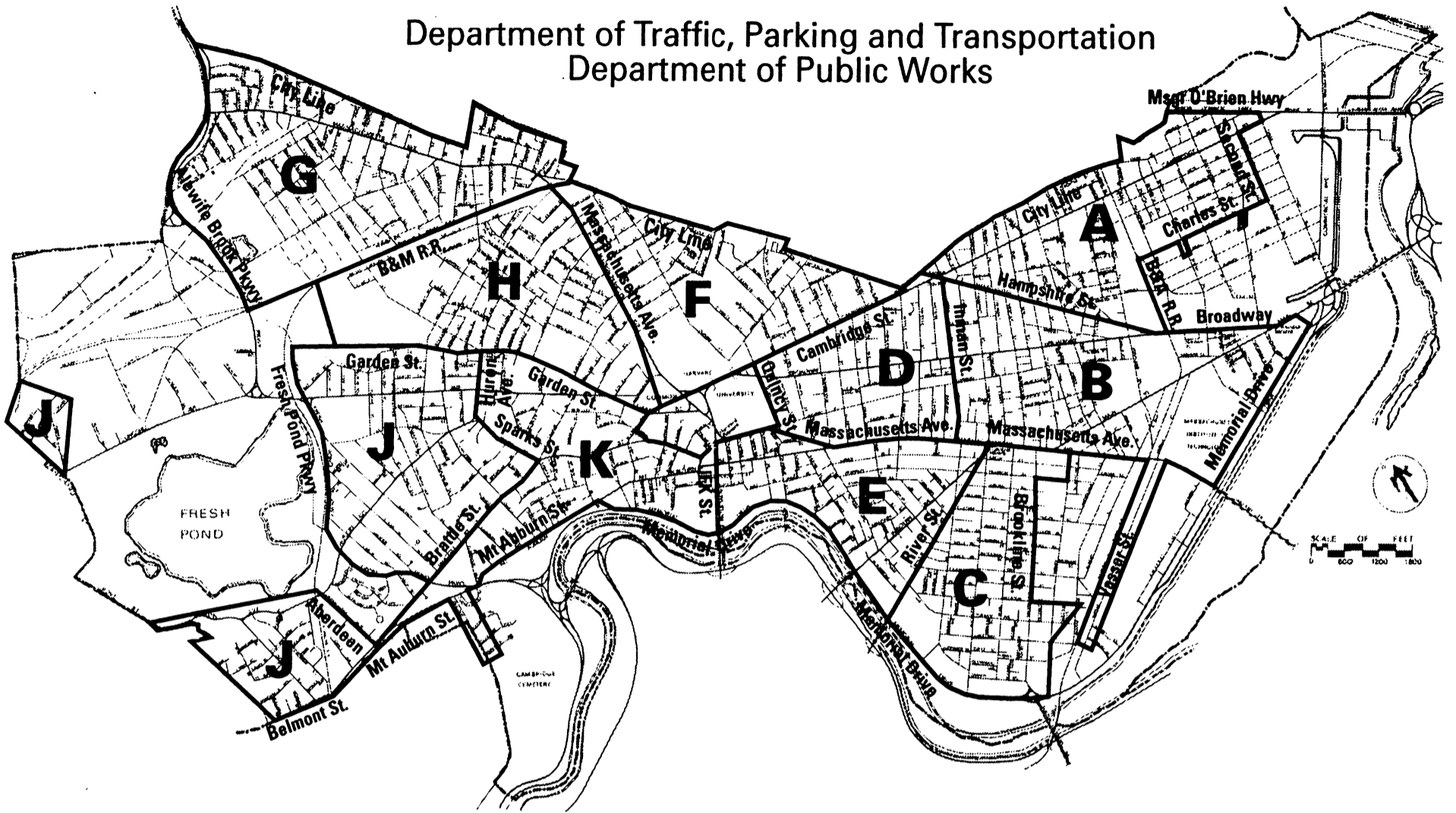

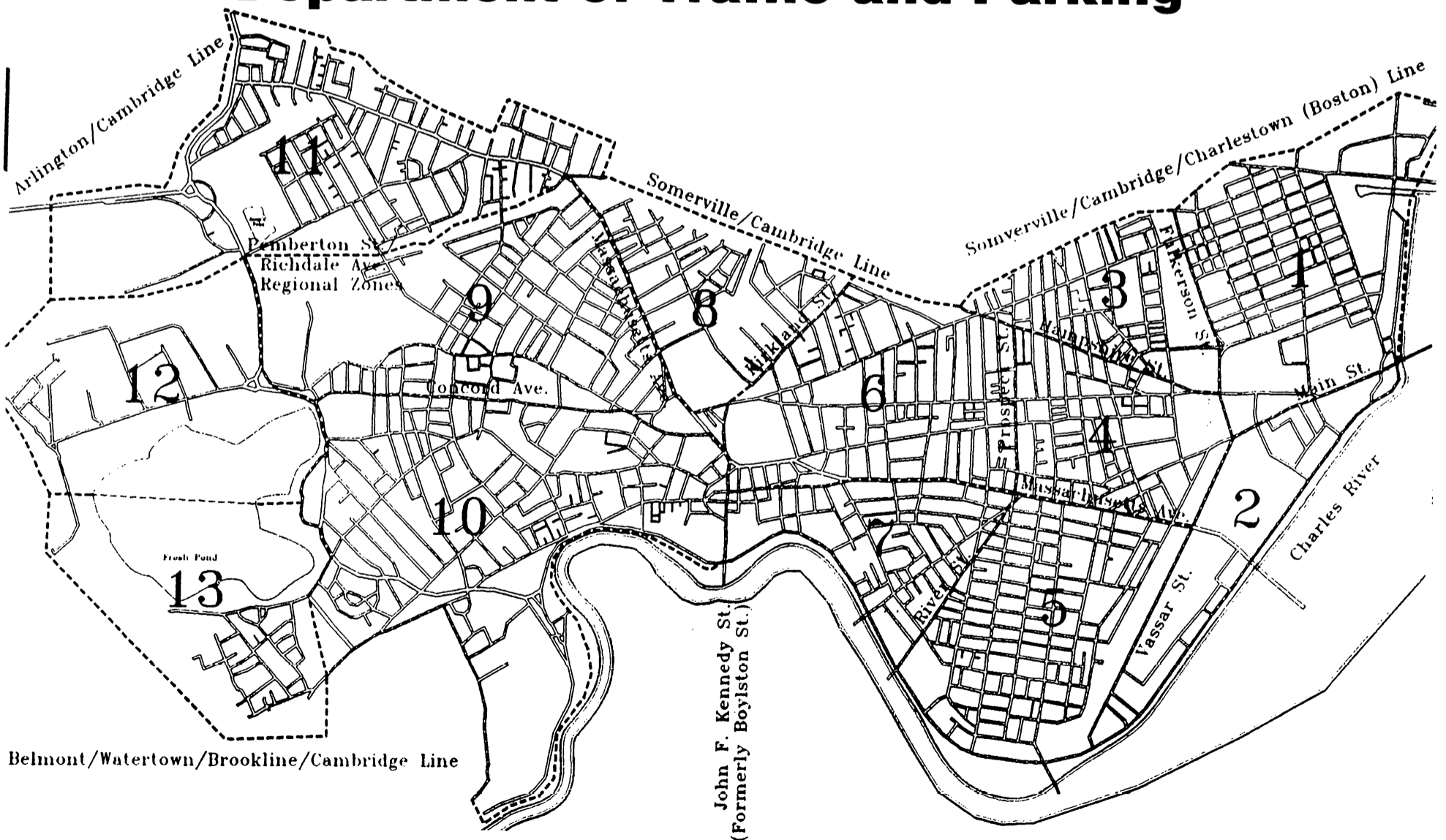

RESIDENT PERMIT PROGRAM
FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS**

Q. When will my 2000 Resident Parking Permit Sticker expire ?

A. Your 2000 Resident Sticker and visitor permit will expire on January 31, 2001

Q. How do I qualify for a Resident Parking Sticker ?

A. Your vehicle must be registered in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and principally garaged in Cambridge at your residential address and in the custody of a resident and weigh less than 2 1/2 tons. You must show proof of residency. A utility bill (i.e. current gas, electric, telephone or cable television bill) in your name, dated for service at your residence within 30 days.

Q. How do I obtain a Massachusetts registration or change my principal place of garaging to Cambridge ?

A. To register your vehicle in Massachusetts and change your principal place of garaging to Cambridge, you must contact your insurance agent. They will guide you through the process.

Q. Can I obtain a temporary permit while in the process of obtaining a Massachusetts registration or changing my principle place of garage ing to Cambridge ?

A. Yes. The Department will issue you a valid temporary permit for 7 working days for a Massachusetts registration and 14 working days for an out of state registration. Bring your vehicle registration and proof of residency.

Q. I have a leased or company vehicle in my possession. Can I obtain a resident permit ?

A. Yes. But, the vehicle must be registered in Massachusetts and principally garaged in Cambridge, and you must show proof of residency in the form of a current utility bill.

Q. Where do I place my resident sticker ?

A. The sticker should be affixed to the rear windshield lower left corner driver's side. If that is not feasible, affix the sticker to the left rear window. We ask that, if possible, all expired resident stickers should be removed.

Q. If my vehicle registration number changes during the year do I need to obtain a new resident sticker and do I need a new sticker if I buy a new vehicle ?

A. Yes. The registration number on your sticker must match the registration number of your vehicle.

Q. How do I obtain a Visitor Permit ?

A. One Visitor Permit per household can be obtained by showing proof of residency in the form of a current utility bill dated for service at your residence within 30 days. The portion of the bill imprinted with the name and address where the service is rendered is the portion needed. The original bill must be shown; we do not accept photocopies.

Q. Can I use my visitor permit on a vehicle owned or controlled by me ?

A. No. Visitor permits are to be used only by visitors that are visiting the household that was issued the permit.

Q. Is my visitor permit valid throughout the City ?

A. No. Your visitor permit is only valid in the immediate area in which you live.

Q. Where on the vehicle is the visitor permit to be displayed ?

A. The permit must be displayed on the front dashboard above the steering wheel and must be readable from the outside.

Q. I have a visitor who is staying with me for longer than seven days. Can the visitor permit be used for longer periods of time ?

A. Yes. You must request prior permission to use the permit on the same vehicle for a period longer than seven days. This can be done by calling the Department of Traffic, Parking and Transportation at 349-4714.

Q. What should I do if I move from one section of the City to another ?

A. Return the visitor permit issued to you along with a current gas, electric, telephone or cable bill dated for service within 30 days for your new address. A new visitor permit will be issued to you.

Q. What should I do if I move out of Cambridge during the year ?

A. You should return your visitor permit and resident sticker. They are not transferable.

Q. Are there provisions for a rental or leased vehicle that I have in my possession for a short period of time ?

A. Yes. Contact the Department for a temporary sticker.

Q. What should I do if I receive notice that my visitor permit has been revoked for misuse ?

A. Contact this Department in writing as soon as possible. The revocation of your pass could jeopardize your right to obtain future permits.

OTHER FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q. How do I know if a Snow Emergency is declared ?

A. Commercial radio and television broadcasting stations and the Cambridge Public Access television system (Cable TV-Channel 37) will announce that a snow emergency has been declared and a parking ban is in effect. You can also find out by calling 349 4700.

Q. How do I know what side of the street to park on ?

A. During snow storm parking bans, the City of Cambridge prohibits parking on both sides of all major street signed as emergency arteries. Parking is also prohibited on secondary streets where signs have been posted on one side of the street.

Q. Who is required to remove snow and ice from the sidewalk that borders private property ?

A. City Ordinance 12.16.110 requires the owner or occupant of private property to remove snow from the sidewalk within 12 hours after snow falls in the day time, and before 1 P.M. after a snowfall during the evening. Ice must be removed from the sidewalk or covered with salt, sand or other suitable substance, by the owner or occupant within 6 hours after the sidewalk becomes covered with ice. Failure to comply will result in a warning for the first violation and a \$25.00 ticket for the second violation.

Q. How can I report a sidewalk that has not been shoveled ?

A. Call the Snow/Ice Hot Line at 349-4903.

Q. Can I reserve a parking spot on a public street with barriers, old chairs, trash barrels, ironing boards, or any other place holder on the street or sidewalk ?

A. No. The Department of Public Works will continue with the practice of removing these items on a daily basis. Placing barriers on the street to reserve a parking space severely hinders the Public Works Department's ability to keep the streets safe for vehicular and pedestrian travel.

Q. How do I reserve a parking space for a moving van ?

A. If you need parking spaces reserved for a moving van, you must get a Street Obstruction Permit from the Traffic, Parking & Transportation Department. The application should be submitted at least three working days prior to the move. You need to come to the Traffic, Parking & Transportation Dept. at 57 Inman Street to fill out an application and pay the fee. Once processed, permits will be mailed to you or can be picked up. For questions about this permit or assistance, call 349-4721.

Q. What do I need to do to temporarily close my street for a block party ?

A. Block parties fall under Street Closing permits. These permits are issued for events such as parades, fairs, and block parties; events that require sections of the streets to be closed for limited periods of time. If this is the first time the event is occurring, the applicant is required to get signatures of a majority of residents who will be impacted by the event. Bring the petition to the Traffic and Parking Department where you can pick up the permit application, fees are collected at this time. The application must be approved by the Police Department (5 Western Avenue) and Fire Headquarters (489 Broadway). After the three-day processing period, the permit can be picked up at the Traffic and Parking Department.
