AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance entitled "The Municipal Code of the City of Cambridge"

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

AN ORDINANCE REGARDING THE SALE, POSSESSION AND USE OF LASER POINTERS

Be it ordained by the City Council of Cambridge, in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 43B, Section 13, and any other applicable law as follows:

WHEREAS, laser pointers are being used by individuals especially minors in such a manner as to harass, annoy and potentially cause bodily harm to those receiving contact with the laser beam; and

WHEREAS, laser beam pointers are capable of causing temporary flash blindness, headaches and afterimages from contact with the eye.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED that the City of Cambridge recognizes the inherent risk of injury of laser pointers when used inappropriately and establishes this regulation to protect the health and safety of its citizens.

Section 1. Definitions:

For purposes of this Ordinance, the following definitions shall apply:

- (A) "Laser pointer" means any device that emits light amplified by the stimulated emission of radiation that is visible to the human eye.
- (B) "Person" means any natural person, corporation, partnership, firm, organization or other legal entity.
- (C) "Public space" means a place to which the public has a right to access, and includes, but is not limited to, any street, highway, parking lot, plaza, transportation facility, place of

amusement, park, or playground.

- (D) "School premises" means the buildings, grounds, or facilities, or any portion thereof, owned, occupied, or under the custody or control of public or private institutions for the primary purpose of providing educational and recreational instruction to students.

Section 2: Sales to Minors Prohibited

It shall be unlawful for any person to give, sell or offer for sale or cause any person to give, sell or offer to sell a laser pointer to any individual eighteen years of age and younger.

Section 3: Sales Restricted

- (a) No person shall sell or offer for sale laser pointers by means of a self service display unless such display is located within 10 feet of the checkout counter and in plain view of the cashier or person on duty and in charge of the establishment.
- (b) No person shall display laser pointers in any manner or post a sign advertising the availability of laser pointers unless a notice has been posted to it indicating that the sale or giving of laser pointers to persons eighteen years of age or younger is a violation of this ordinance.

Section 4: Possession Restricted

- (a) No person twenty years of age and younger shall possess a laser pointer on school premises; and
- (b) No person eighteen years of age and younger shall possess a laser pointer while in a public space; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall preclude:
- (1) the possession on school premises of a laser pointer by a person twenty years of age or younger for a valid instructional, school-related or employment purpose, where such laser pointer is used under the supervision of a school staff person, other authorized instructor, or parent; or
 - (2) the possession in a public space of a laser pointer by a person eighteen years of age and younger, during such person's hours of employment, for a valid employment purpose where such laser pointer is used under the supervision of the employer or its agent.

Section 5: Harassment by Laser Beams Prohibited

No person shall focus, point or shine a laser beam directly or indirectly on another person or moving vehicle in such a manner as is intended to harass or annoy said person or any person operating a moving vehicle.

Section 6: Penalty

Any person found to be in violation of this ordinance shall be fined \$300.00 per offense. Enforcement of this ordinance shall be by non-criminal disposition as provided by in M.G.L. Chapter 40, Section 21D or by filing a criminal complaint at the appropriate venue.

For purposes of this Ordinance, the police department shall be the enforcing department.

Violations of Sections 2 and 3 occurring at a place of business shall be the responsibility of the business owner.

Section 7: Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage

A. Add a new Section 5.28
5.28 - Application of FAR and Minimum Lot Area per Dwelling Unit Where More than One Number Appears in the Table of Section 5.30 - District Dimensional Regulations

B. In Table 5-1, make changes in Columns (1), (3) and (5) (all other elements of the Table shall remain unchanged):

C. In Table 5-1, Paragraph 2 - Footnotes, delete footnote (1)

D. In Article 2.000 - Definitions, delete the current definitions "Green Area", "Public Beneficial Open Space", and "Usable Open Space", and substitute therefor the following in the appropriate alphabetical order. In addition, relocate the existing definition "Public Open Space" as indicated below.

E. In Section 530 - District Dimensional Regulations, delete the existing heading in Column (7) in all Tables and substitute therefor the following new heading: (7) Minimum Ratio of Open Space to Lot Area"

F. In Table 5-1, make changes in Column (7).

G. Everywhere the phrase "green area" occurs in the Ordinance, substitute the new phrase "Landscape Open Space". In Section 4.2.7.2 and 4.2.7.3 and Section 5.33-Business Districts, Paragraph 2 - Footnotes, Footnote (1) shall be substituted the phrase "Landscape Open Space" for the phrase "Landscape green space" wherever it occurs.

H. In Section 5.22, delete the existing text in its entirety and substitute text.

I. In Section 8.2.1 add two new Paragraphs J and K

J. Additions and alterations to a structure in existence as of August 1, 1998, which additions and alterations are located within the required rear yard in Residence A-1, A-2, B, C and C-1 districts, and which additions and alterations otherwise conform to all other requirements of this Ordinance.

K. Additions to a structure in existence as of August 1, 1998 otherwise permitted by this Ordinance in Residence A-1, A-2, B, C and C-1 districts on lots where the amount of Open Space required to be present is not met, which additions further reduce the area of Open Space on the lot.

In Amendment to the "Zoning Ordinance of the City of Cambridge"

Amend the text of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Cambridge by striking Section 11.511 in its entirety and replacing it with the following Section 11.511 as follows:

A Planning Overlay Special Permit shall be required from the Planning Board for all projects subject to Section 11.502. The Planning Board may request reports from the Planning, Development Department, Conservation Commission, Historical Commission or other pertinent boards or commissions regarding compliance with the provisions of Policies 13, 27, 39 and 66 as set forth in Section 11.512. Before a building permit for a project to which Paragraph 11.502 applies can be issued, the project must receive a Planning Overlay Special Permit. The applicant for the Planning Overlay Special Permit

may be simultaneous with the application to the Planning Board for other special permits. No application for special permit will be accepted unless it is accompanied, at a minimum, by the following documents:

(a) the information required by the Large Project Submittal Requirements as described in Paragraph 1.45 of this Ordinance.

(b) a traffic study certified as being done in a complete and reliable manner by the Traffic, Parking and Transportation Department. The required traffic study shall include information on Parking Transport, traffic Demand Management measures which may mitigate projected traffic impacts. Such certification must apply for or denied within ten (10) days of the request and must only certify the methodology used, not necessarily the accuracy of the data.

Any applicant who has been granted a special permit prior to the effective date of this amendment must apply for a "Planning Overlay Special Permit" no later than sixty days (60) after the issuance of the original special permit.

CRLS science team reflects on Olympiad victory

Sudnick and Kris Newton, a commitment which is intense, draining, and undoubtedly a "bonding" experience.

"I've never worked so hard for something in my entire life, and I've never been in a situation where everyone was so focused on something," said senior Bushra Makiya. "Everyone worked so hard and there was not a single person who didn't contribute, which was awesome."

At the same time, the last few days were not easy. "The week leading up to the competition had been really hard on some of us," said sophomore Ben Somberg. "The night before ... was especially tough for me when our Mission Possible [Rube Goldberg] device just wasn't working, and we knew we were going to have to come in the next day with something we weren't exactly proud of."

On the day of the competition, the pressure built, until the entire team was sitting together in the auditorium, waiting for the final results to be read.

"It was incredibly tense until we heard that Wayland High School came in second, and we knew we must be in first place," said junior Walter Driscoll.

To senior captain Rabi Whitaker, the moment when Cambridge's name was read and the room exploded with cheers and whistles seemed almost too good to be true.

"Every year before the Olympiad, I think about our chances of winning, and how much time we've spent preparing," Whitaker said. "Every year, I think we have just as good a shot at the championship as any other team. But this year, when we actually won, I was in a state of complete shock. I never imagined just how thrilling it would be to get up on stage as the first place team."

To some extent, the triumphant atmosphere of those moments on the stage endured the next week. Currently on a break before resuming preparation for the na-

tional competition, held in Chicago in May, science teamers nonetheless find themselves drawn to the room where so many hours were spent studying. On the days when meetings were held, most students did not leave but lingered, joking and chatting with the people who they have spent so many hours with. Leaving any time before 4 p.m. was just too weird.

"I enjoy leaving school at 2:30, but at the same time it feels strange," said senior captain Noaman Vaidya. "This is the first time I've seen sunlight in two months. Everyone's been congratulating us all week. What a thrill it is to win!"

Especially for seniors, who saw the team come in fourth three years ago, then third, then second, and then first, this year's win and the upcoming trip to Chicago are the culmination of years of work. But for everyone on the team or connected with it, it is a hard-won victory, and one to be savored.

department," said junior Emma Stickgold. "We are so lucky to have so many great teachers who are willing to dedicate countless hours to help students by their events. The captains are to be commended for their excellent work in bringing the team together and making things work."

Things worked this year for the CRLS science team, and that's what they have been celebrating all week.

When the Cambridge Rindge and Latin School science team took first place at the state science Olympiad competition recently, the 20 team members present shouted, cried, jumped, and even sang.

After the weeks of intense study and preparation, of graham crackers, microwave popcorn and crises in a classroom at the high school for hours after school, the tension was finally broken — and in the best possible manner.

March 20, the day of the competition, had not been easy. No one was certain that Cambridge would win, even after the medals for individual events had been announced. And so, when the trophy came, it was that much sweeter.

In the last two weeks before the Olympiad competition, the entire team spent five hours a day after school preparing under the supervision of coaches Tad

Trip to Russia marks 10th anniversary

Ten years ago this April, the CRLS Russian program hosted its first group of students and teachers from Russia.

The guests were here two weeks, then the CRLS Russian students, accompanied by Russian teacher Lucinda Leveille and science teacher Tad Sudnick, made the trek to Jaroslavl, Russia; thereby completing the first high school Russian exchange in Cambridge history.

Since 1990, the CRLS Russian Exchange has been paired with school #238 in St. Petersburg. The fifth round of exchange with this school will be completed with Leveille and five brave CRLS Russian students heading off April 10 for a 20-day expedition to St. Petersburg.

Stephen Huebner, Ilya Lavush, Case Randall, Christina Roth, and Ronald Stewart will join the ranks of the 52 CRLS students who have traveled to Russia over the years. Plans for St. Petersburg include

sightseeing, helping out in English language classes at School #238, historic walks around the city, museum visits, cultural events like ballet, music performances and opera, outdoor picnics, and time at home with hosts.

CRLS homework is done on a daily basis so that students will not fall behind in their studies, and they keep a daily journal to remember and reflect upon their experience.

The Cambridge guests are always accompanied by their Russian hosts on excursions and walks around the city. With the political situation a bit tricky due to the NATO intervention in Serbia, Leveille will decide while in St. Petersburg whether or not to go to Moscow for the planned three-day visit. Plans for Moscow include the Bolshoi Theater, the Kremlin, the Tretyakov Gallery and the Tchaikovsky Conservatory.

The group will return Saturday, May 1, 1999, exactly 10 years after

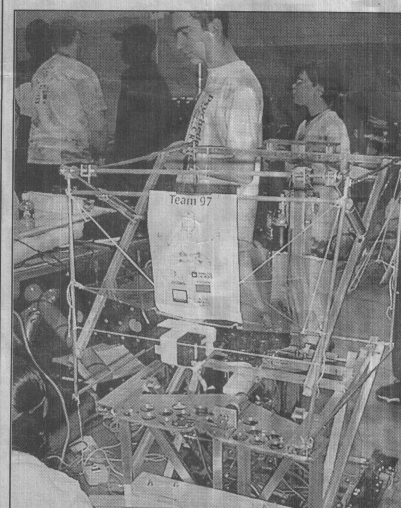

Cleary brothers talk hockey, life

Belmont Hill is a school that has always had a rich pedigree of athletic talent. The school does have one 'signature' sport which has turned out more than its share of professionals, though: hockey.

Recently, as a continuing part of its 75th anniversary celebrations, the school invited five former hockey players who ended up playing for the U.S. Olympic team to speak to the student body. Those who came back included Cambridge natives and 1960 gold-medal winning brothers Bob ('52) and Bill ('54) Cleary; 1984 teammates and siblings Mark ('79) and Scott ('81) Fusco; and 1992 national team member C.J. Young, who went on to play for the Pittsburgh Penguins.

"We've always had a great tradition in all sports. One of the great things about here is that they had us play three sports," said Cambridge native Bill Cleary, who went on to coach hockey at Harvard and is now the

Cleary noted that he was a member of some successful football and baseball teams, while up on the Hill as well, adding that baseball was his "first love."

"Hockey's been a big part of that tradition," said Cleary, who coached the Fuscos and Young at Harvard. "We've had some wonderful teams, some wonderful players."

Mark Fusco, the 1983 Hobey Baker Award winner and a defenseman while playing for Bill Cleary at Harvard, said the school's tough academic workload proves the term "student-athlete" is not nearing extinction.

"I hear a lot that athletes can't be students and athletes," said Fusco. "I don't agree. Belmont Hill proves that."

Young, who went on to play for the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins, noted his experience

playing lacrosse is a memory which will stay with him for a long time.

"When we were sophomores, most of us had never picked up lacrosse stick," said Young, whose hockey team won the New England championship while at Belmont Hill. "What we really gained was our cohesiveness, we overcame hurdles. By our senior year, we were vying for the league championship."

Young also told the students, "the more you can build your athleticism, the better you are, not just athletically."

Having the teachers he had at Belmont Hill was something which Young will not forget. "I was fortunate to have great role models and great teachers who instilled values into me," he said.

After the lecture from the athletes, students were able to walk up and ask questions. Also on display were the medals which the players had won during their Olympic quests.

While winning is something which all athletes strive for, Bill Cleary tried to put things into perspective.

"We all want to win and we should want to win," said Cleary, "but everything is about people."

Poisson is perfect

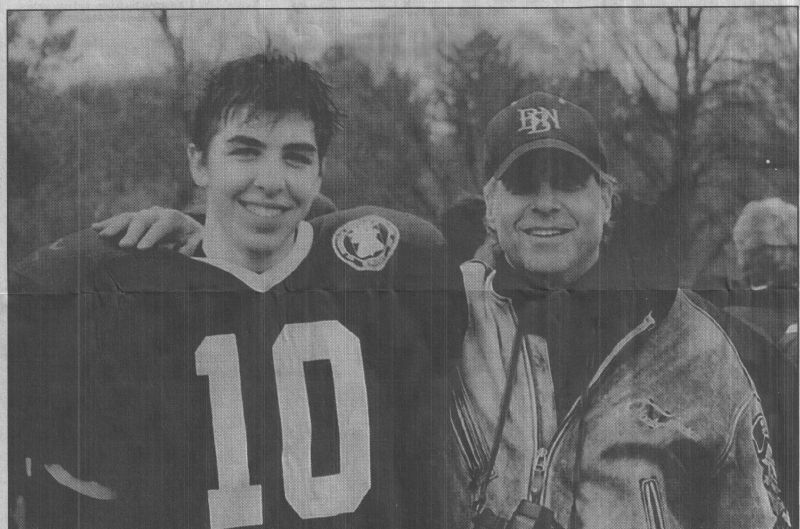
The Cambridge Rindge and Latin junior varsity baseball team completed last week in perfect fashion.

WHEREAS, laser pointers are being
used by individuals especially minor
children for the simulated harassment
and potentially cause bodily harm to those
receiving contact with the laser beam; and

WHEREAS, laser beam pointers are capable
of causing temporary flash blindness,
headaches and afterimages from
contact with the eye.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED
that the City of Cambridge recognizes the
inherent risk of injury of laser pointers
when used inappropriately and establishes
this regulation to protect the health
and safety of its citizens.

Section 1: Definitions:
For purposes of this Ordinance, the following
definitions shall apply:

- (A) "Laser pointer" means any device that
emits light amplified by the stimulated
emission of radiation that is visible to the
human eye.
(B) "Person" means any natural person,
corporation, partnership, firm, organization
or other legal entity.
(C) "Public space" means a place to which
the public has a right to access, and
includes, but is not limited to, any
streets, highways, parking lots, plaza, transportation
facility, place of amusement, park
or playground.
(D) "School premises" means the buildings,
grounds, or facilities, or any portion
thereof, owned, occupied, or under the
custody or control of public or private
institutions for the primary purpose of
providing educational and recreational
instruction to students.

Section 3: Sales Restricted

- (a) No person shall sell or offer for sale
laser pointers by means of a self service
display unless such display is located
within 10 feet of the checkout counter
and in plain view of the cashier or person
in duty and in charge of the establishment.
(b) No person shall display laser pointers

In City Council April 5, 1999

The Ordinance Committee held a public meeting on March 24, 1999, beginning at 5:20 p.m. in the Sullivan Chamber for the purpose of considering a proposed amendment to the Municipal Code to ban the sale of laser pointer pens to minors (Attachment A).

Present at the hearing were Councillor Henrietta Davis, Chair of the Committee, Mayor Francis H. Duehay, Councillor Sheila T. Russell, Councillor Michael A. Sullivan, and City Clerk D. Margaret Drury.

Councillor Davis convened the hearing and explained the purpose. She invited Councillor Sullivan, who had requested the draft ordinance, to explain the proposal.

Councillor Sullivan stated that the issue first came to his attention as a result of efforts by Councillor Connelly in Boston to address the danger presented by these pens. They can be used as weapons and manufacturers are actually marketing them with this in mind. They have already resulted in injuries.

This ordinance will prohibit the sale of laser pointers to minors and will prohibit self service displays in stores unless the display is located within ten feet of the checkout counter. It also prohibits possession of laser pointers by minors while in public spaces.

Mayor Duehay moved that the proposed amendment be forwarded to the full City Council with the recommendation that it be ordained. The motion passed without objection on a voice vote.

The hearing was adjourned at 5:30 p.m.


