MAYOR VELLUCCI

WHEREAS: The Salvation Army, under the direction of Captain Randy Davis, opened their doors to the community of people who are homeless and without food and money, as of March 1, 1983; and

WHEREAS: The program offers a morning brunch, hot afternoon lunch and afternoon snack, of which to date, April 30, 1983, the program operates three days a week serving fifty people each day; and

WHEREAS: The Salvation Army Shelter Program could most definitely use surplus food orders from the State and the U.S. Government; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council endorse this most humanitarian project and wishes to go on record notifying Mr. Raftery of the Bureau of Nutrition, Quincy Center Plaza, 1385 Hancock Street, Quincy, MA, 02169, that it would be the pleasing wish of the Cambridge City Council if the said Bureau of Nutrition would help the Cambridge Salvation Army to surplus food orders; and be it further

RESOLVED: That Mr. Raftery be asked graciously if they could also assist the University Lutheran Church Shelter if they so desire food orders, and any other organization that can or may quality for surplus food.

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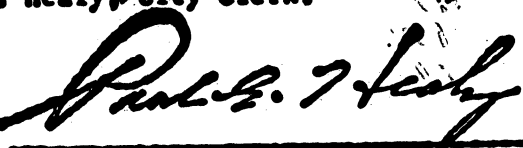
