Gentlemen: I return
herewith the petition of D. A. Buckley praying "for the
passage of an ordinance preventing the assignment
of pay by the employes and officers of this city"
which was referred to me by your Board "for an
opinion as to the practicability of such an ordinance";

No ordinance passed by the city would affect
any such assignment. The power of the city as
such over such an assignment is no other nor
greater than the power of any person or corporation
who hires help.

Every employer, whether individual or corporate,
can refuse to employ persons who assign their
pay, and so may the city. But that is the limit
of its power.
