IN BOARD OF ALDERMEN, August 4, 1884.

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Board, the public necessity and convenience require the laying out of certain land in this city as a gravel pit, from which may be taken earth and gravel necessary for the construction, repair, or improvement of streets and ways, and the laying out of such ways as may be deemed necessary for convenient access thereto, -

ORDERED, That notice be given to the owners of land late of William Gay, deceased, and all other persons interested, that this Board intends to lay out a strip of land fifty feet in width, adjoining the city land, known as the old Belmont Gravel Bank, now within the limits of Cambridge, - upon two sides, measuring two hundred and forty-six feet in length upon one side and two hundred and twenty-two feet upon the other, all as shown on a plan on file in the office of the City Engineer.

The earth and gravel to be removed to grade 29, as computed from the city base, and being by estimation about 11,076 cubic yards; and that

is assigned as the time for hearing any objections which may be made thereto.
