DAYS OF REMEMBRANCE OF THE VICTIMS AND SURVIVORS OF THE HOLOCAUST APRIL 22 - APRIL 28, 1990

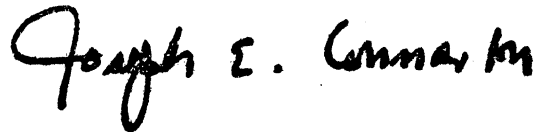
- WHEREAS: The years 1933 to 1945 represented among the darkest years in human history with the mass murder of six million Jews, and thousands of Protestants and Catholic Clergy and lay people, Jehovah's Witnesses, political dissidents, gay men and lesbians, handicapped persons and gypsies, in a systematic genocide promulgated by the Nazi party of Germany; and
- WHEREAS: Atrocities such as those committed in 1933-1945 must never be forgotten; and
- WHEREAS: In an era in which rapid changes in governments all over the world, sparking ethnic pride and rivalries, stimulate uncertainty and a need to be ever vigilant; and
- WHEREAS: The people of Cambridge representing a multiple of cultures, and including Holocaust survivors and families of its victims, will never forget this dark age of human history; and
- WHEREAS: We, the people of Cambridge, to remain proud and affirming of our diversity, must be eternally vigilant against all forms of bigotry and must not allow any forms of prejudice to seep into the fabric of our lives providing a breeding ground for tyranny to flourish; and
- WHEREAS: The United States Congress established the United States Holocaust Memorial Council to: "provide for appropriate ways for the Nation to Commemorate the Days of Remembrance and to encourage and sponsor appropriate observances of such Days of Remembrance throughout the United States"; and
- WHEREAS: Members of the Cambridge community from many backgrounds will gather on April 26, 1990 at Temple Beth Shalom of Cambridge on Tremont Street to remember "the voices that were silenced," the victims and survivors of the Holocaust, and to strive to overcome prejudice, intolerance, and ignorance that exist in our every day lives; therefore, be it

- RESOLVED: That, in memory of the Holocaust, the Cambridge City Council hereby designates April 22 - April 28, 1990 as the Days of Remembrance of the Holocaust; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council dedicate this week particularly to remembering the voices that were silenced; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council hereby commits itself to eliminating prejudice and inhumanity through a deeper awareness of history and our common humanity; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council invites the diverse members of the community to participate on Thursday, April 26 at 7:00 PM at Temple Beth Shalom of Cambridge in a community gathering to remember the victims and survivors of the Holocaust; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That this resolution be disseminated as part of the observances of the Days of Remembrance.
