- WHEREAS: This year, more than 180,000 women in the United States will learn for the first time that they have breast cancer, a condition that will result in more than 40,000 deaths; and
- WHEREAS: In fact, breast cancer is the most frequently diagnosed cancer for American women, however, early detection and prompt treatment can significantly reduce the suffering and deaths caused by this disease; and
- WHEREAS: In responding to this important health issue, the City Council is encouraging the community to promote National Breast Cancer Awareness Month (NBCAM) in October, to observe Friday, October 15 as National Mammography Day and to participate in the 1999 Making Strides Against Breast Cancer walk being held on Sunday, October 3, 1999, beginning at the Esplanade along the Charles River in Boston; and
- WHEREAS: In the last six years, the Making Strides Against Breast Cancer walk has raised almost 10 million dollars, and anticipates raising an additional 2.5 million dollars in 1999 to help fight breast cancer; and
- WHEREAS: Funds raised through the annual walk and early detection methods such as regular mammograms have, over the past six years, led to a 21% decrease in deaths resulting from breast cancer in Massachusetts alone; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That the City Council go on record as strongly supporting all efforts in the advancement in preventative and curative medicine to combat breast cancer.

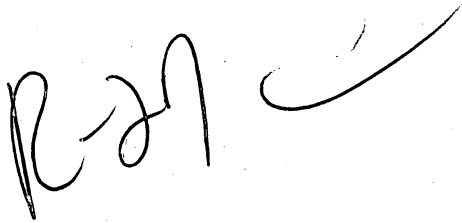
