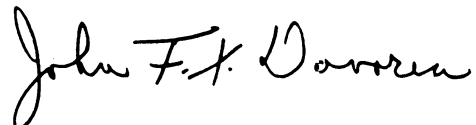

Articles of Organization

Supplement

2. The purposes for which the corporation was formed are as follows:

1. To serve local communities and the region as a whole by means of but not limited to carefully planned and operated programs and events of a cultural-recreational nature (i.e. the arts and crafts, recreation, education, and related areas of activity and/or concern); thereby, to encourage a sense of community spirit, to further service existing leisure-time needs and generally foster the arts.
2. No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its officers, members, trustees, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article First hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in, (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal income tax under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Law).
3. To hold property for the corporation's purposes; to purchase, own, erect, acquire by grant, gift, devise or bequest, improve, mortgage, pledge, lease, sell, assign, transfer or otherwise dispose of real and personal property not exceeding Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) as may be necessary for the carrying out of the purposes of the corporation.
4. Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Board of Trustees shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively.

for the purposes of the corporation in such manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), as the Board of Trustees shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the Court of Common Pleas of the county in which the principal office of the corporation is located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

5. To take all action permitted by law as may be necessary or incidental to, the carrying out of the purposes of the corporation.

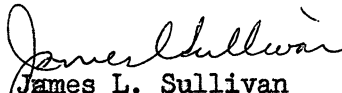
