We The subscribers, Citizens and residents of that part of the City called North Cambridge respectfully petition that the water may be furnished from the hydrants to water South Avenue from the Railroad Bridge to Rice Street, and from petitioners would represent that there is no other place within a reasonable distance where the water can be procured, Alewife Brook where the water is almost as fresh as from the hydrants, being the nearest and there, there are no facilities for pumping the water, and the distance is about the same from the Railroad Bridge to Alewife Brook as from the Railroad Bridge to Richardson's Wharf. There is an immense amount of heavy travel over this part of the Avenue which goes to the neighboring cities over Mill Row street and watering the street does a great deal to keep the street in repair as well as to make it a pleasant place of residence, and from petitioners believe the what they ask for will be a great public benefit aside from the benefit to those who live in the immediate vicinity.
