

City of Cambridge,

in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven.

An Ordinance,

to prevent racing and immoderate driving of horses on the streets of the city.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge, as follows:—

1. Every person who shall ride any horse, or drive any horse or horses attached to a carriage of any description, either of burden or pleasure, or cause the same to be rode or driven, for trial of speed, or at an immoderate speed, on any street or public highway, or on any bridge, in the city, or shall disturb the public peace by noises, shouts, or outcries, while riding or driving, shall, upon conviction, forfeit and pay, for each offence, a sum not exceeding twenty dollars.

2. This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.
