- WHEREAS: This City Council was saddened upon learning of the passage of Theodore Layne on March 19, 1983; and
- WHEREAS: The son of the late Abraham and Inez Layne and a life-long resident of Cambridge, Theodore "Ted" Layne attended the Cambridge Public Schools, graduated from Rindge Technical High School and also attended the University of Massachusetts, Boston where he studied Electrical Engineering; and
- WHEREAS: Ted served his country during the Second World War in the United States Army from 1943 to 1945 where he was awarded the Good Conduct Medal, the Victory Medal, and the European African Middle Eastern Theatre Campaign Ribbon; and
- WHEREAS: After receiving an honorable discharge at Fort Devens on December 22, 1945, Ted worked at the Boston Naval Shipyard in Charlestown as an Electrical Engineer, after which he was employed by the U.S. Postal Service as a Letter Carrier in the Cambridge A Station, from where he retired in 1980 due to illness; and
- WHEREAS: A life-long member of St. Bartholemew's Episcopal Church in Cambridge, Ted served on the Usher Board for many years, sang in the Men's Choir and he was Vice President of the Young People's Fellowship; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That this City Council go on record extending its deepest sympathy to his beloved wife Gladys (Cooper), his two sons, Theodore D., Jr., and Kevin N., a daughter-in-law Mila, a grandson Christopher, a sister Madria (Madina) Grant, a brother Emanuel D. Layne, nieces, nephews, cousins, other relatives and a host of friends, all who will miss Ted greatly; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to forward a suitable engrossed copy of this resolution to Mrs. Theodore Layne and the entire Layne family on behalf of the entire City Council.
