It has come to the attention of this City Council that on Monday, October 18, 1976, President Gerald R. Ford awarded the National Medal of Science to Harvard Professor of Chemistry E. Bright Wilson and to MIT Professor Emeritus Manson Benedict, and

WHEREAS:

This is the nation's highest award for distinguished scientific achievement in the fields of physical, biological, mathematical or engineering sciences, and

WHEREAS:

Professor Wilson was cited for fundamental theoretical and experimental contributions to understanding the structure of molecules, and

WHEREAS:

Professor Benedict was praised for his leadership in the development of gaseous diffusion plants for uranium isotope separation and for his role in creating the discipline of nuclear engineering, now therefore be it

RESOLVED:

That this City Council go on record extending our sincere congratulations to both Professor Wilson and Professor Benedict as they receive this award of distinction, and be it further

RESOLVED:

That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to forward a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution to each gentleman as a remembrance to them by this City Council.
