WHEREAS: The City of Cambridge is proud of its long history of support of the enfranchisement of all Americans; and

WHEREAS: This past August marked the 75th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, an Amendment long overdue, which extended to the women of this country, the right to vote; and

WHEREAS: Visionaries like Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony conducted 56 campaigns of referenda to male voters, 480 legislative campaigns, 47 campaigns to influence State Constitutional Conventions, 277 campaigns at State Party Conventions for women suffrage planks, and 19 campaigns with 19 successive Congress, before the 19th Amendment was ratified; and

WHEREAS: The City of Cambridge is proud of those early visionaries, who fought to the end to see that women were given the chance to express themselves at the ballot box; and

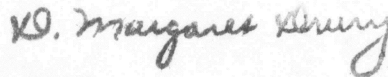
WHEREAS: The City of Cambridge is also proud to join the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate in designating 1995 as "The Women Suffrage Jubilee," and plans to commemorate this event with a ceremony at Cambridge City Hall; now therefore be it
