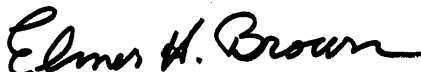

RESOLUTION TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE CAMBRIDGE CITY COUNCIL

October 6, 1969

- WHEREAS: American Armed Forces have been engaged for four years in vast and deadly combat in Vietnam; and
- WHEREAS: Combat deaths now exceed 44,798* Americans (far above the death toll in the Korean war) and vastly larger numbers of Vietnamese civilians and combat forces, and our nation continues to spend \$100,000,000 per day to finance what has come to be regarded as a hopeless war; and
- WHEREAS: This city and other cities and rural areas across the country urgently need massive federal funding for housing, schooling, and for feeding the millions of children and elderly people who are living on a near-starvation budget; and
- WHEREAS: Continuance of this war has brought grief and divisiveness to our own country, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council hereby petition the administration of President Richard M. Nixon and the Congress of the United States to end this war; to revise the present priorities of spending and to allocate the moneys spent on this vast and costly war to the rebuilding of cities and the housing and feeding of poor people at home and abroad.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that his honor the Mayor declare October 15th, 1969 to be in the City of Cambridge a day of renewed dedication to the search for peace and world community.
