Aide to Mass. representative

Cheryl M. Donahue, a legislative aide to state Rep. Daniel Valianti (D-Marlborough), died early Saturday of injuries sustained in an automobile crash in Sudbury. She was 26.

Born in Somerville, Miss Donahue recently moved to Marlborough. She graduated in 1985 from St. Clement's High School in Medford and worked for two years at Heritage Hospital in Somerville.

She also worked for more than five years at the Somerville Mental Health Clinic, including part-time work after she went to Valianti's office. She had planned to study nursing.

"At 26, she was on the road to great things," Valianti said yesterday. "Her life was tragically cut short. She was wonderful in so many ways, it's hard to deal with the loss."

Miss Donahue leaves her parents, Joseph and Shirley Donahue of Somerville; a brother, Joseph W. Donahue 3d of Somerville; two sisters, Paula Ann Donahue of Arkansas and Robin Stout of Quincy; her maternal grandmother, Georgia Mills of Tennessee; her paternal grandparents, Joseph W. and Marion Donahue of Somerville; a nephew and many cousins.

The funeral Mass will be said tomorrow at 10 a.m. in St. Ann's Church in Somerville.

Road repair bond bill should be passed quickly

Municipal officials across Massachusetts agreed with the April 28 editorial that urged the state Legislature to expedite action on a pending state transportation bond bill. As the Globe stressed, unless the Legislature approves the bill quickly, a variety of much-needed road projects will be put on hold, which means wasting another construction season.

The need for general road improvements is evident to anyone who has driven recently and noticed the potholes and other damage caused by the brutal winter of 1994. Approximately \$300 million would be made available to cities and towns under the state's so-called Chapter 90 local road construction program if the bill is passed immediately.

In fact, the Globe might have understated the significance of immediate action on the bill. Cities and towns have already waited a long time for help in funding road repairs. The state has failed to appropriate any funds for Chapter 90 grants for the current fiscal year. That's why the bond bill is even more crucial now.
