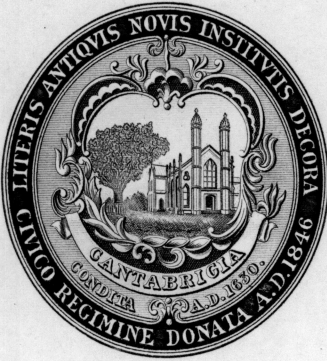

Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the
City of Cambridge:-

As requested by you in an order adopted on October 17th, current, I have had conference with the Committee having in charge the recent Industrial Carnival in Cambridge with reference to the payment of money to members of the Police Force for extra duty performed by them during the week.

As has already been publicly stated by the members of the said committee they are loud in their praise of the work of the police during the entire week, and have nothing but words of praise for the entire department. At the close of the Carnival, however, they find that there is no surplus, but, on the other hand, that there is a deficit, to meet which, the merchants will be compelled to personally contribute. Notwithstanding this, however, it is the intention of the merchants to make a contribution to the Police Relief Asso. in appreciation of the work of the police during Carnival week. This is the first time in a great many years that the police have been called upon to do extra duty of this kind, and they responded in a manner alike creditable to the department and the City, and this, as perhaps your Board knows, I have taken notice of by publicly commending the department.
